

## 92-Year-Old Veteran Has Great Time at CSD Convention until Lights Suddenly Go Out By Ron Abel



I had an unexpected weekend in St. Charles. All went well until Saturday evening, when I was watching the show in the back of the hall,

at which time I passed out. They tell me there was a commotion and that our **Steve Keisker** was the first to get to me. An ambulance was summoned.

**Greg Busch**, who drove me to St. Charles, followed me to St. Joseph Hospital a couple of miles away. I subsequently spent three days there, undergoing numerous tests in controlling blood pressure, thyroid concerns and the fact I was badly dehydrated.

Numerous chapter members called and visited, offering rides home through Sunday, but the time of my release kept being unknown. My daughter and son-in-law eventually drove up to get me home.

I'm currently following up with my Cardiologist for a stress test, heart monitor and I eventually may require a pacemaker. In the meantime, I must have someone staying with me day and night. I feel fine, and what frustrates me is I'm not permitted to drive until a final decision is made on stabilizing my blood pressure.

It's great becoming a senior, senior citizen, . . . I guess! 🎔



**ME** volunteer to write an article about *New Harmony Handful* happenings? No way! I'm the new 'kid on the block' and I've been absent more than I've been present. Oh well, I'll write about my experiences during one of my extended absences.

I was invited to join the *Handful* in late Spring and attended one of their meetings. On 29 July I visited two church services where they sang. They looked like they were having fun and the congregations certainly appreciated their music. On Aug. 9, sporting my version of their well-known mulberry-colored shirts, I sang with them in two retirement centers north of the River. I was 'hooked'; I was ready to get a shirt of the correct color and become an active member of the *Handful*.

Since 2012 my friendly cardiologist and I had been monitoring the progression of my heart's aortic stenosis. In 2014 I was treated on my birthday with a brand-new stent inserted in a badly blocked left anterior descending artery on my heart (the nurses call this artery the "Widow Maker"). As the results of follow-on scans and echocardiograms flowed in during this past spring and summer, it became apparent that my severe aortic stenosis was now more severe and that my Birthday Present Stent was closing in with scar tissue. It was time for action, and, before I knew it, I was scheduled for aortic valve replacement and a single cardiac bypass surgery using the good old-fashioned open-chest method on 28 September. The surgery went well but in the process I managed to suffer a slight stroke affecting my right side.

After a few days in The University of Kansas Hospital's Center for Advanced Heart Care I was transferred to their Inpatient Acute Rehabilitation Center. Shortly after I arrived at the Rehab Center I met my alter ego, Patient Y. We immediately learned that we had a lot in common: former math teachers, spoke German, studied computer science in the days of Hollerith (IBM) punch cards and we liked to laugh. We 'bonded' immediately. The next time we gathered in the meal room we found that the other patients who previously sat with sullen faces awaiting their tray of food were laughing at our antics. Our antics continued throughout my stay in the center. He even managed to organize a 'Birthday Parade' to celebrate my birthday on Oct. 9. The laughter of the onlookers was, to say the least, contagious.

After waiting a long time for our breakfast to arrive one morning, I decided that, should that happen the next morning, it would be a perfect time to ask the gathered patients to sing a few songs. I knew that I had sheets with the lyrics of old well-known songs in a filing cabinet at home; I asked my daughter to bring them in. I was then set for the next time breakfast was late. Breakfast was late the next three mornings, and we sang! The patients in my midst perked up and had smiles on their faces, staff members passing by in the hallways stopped and listened, and when we finished a song, applause erupted from the surrounding areas. I am firmly convinced that singing was good 'medicine' for all of us. An example of the healing by laughter and song I feel certain took place in Patient X. The first day we met her she was angry: she didn't want to be there; the food didn't suit her; she was uncomfortable; nothing was right. The last meal we shared with her she was smiling and actively engaging in lively conversation with all of us.

Ah, the power of singing! I am glad that I had an opportunity to make a small contribution in support of our motto "Keep the Whole World Singing." I look forward to many opportunities to help deliver the harmonious sounds of the *New Harmony Handful* in the future. **\***
