# BILL, DWAIN AGREE: HOA UP AND RUNNING

What an exhausting, exhilarating, encouraging, eye-opening week! A 3-hour coaching session with singing guru **Bill Biffle**, followed four days later by a 7-hour workout with PRES ace **Dwain Brobst.** 

Lots of changes and fixes await us, and we gotta work on qualifying all the 80-plus signed up for Cedar Rapids. But the goal is in sight, not to mention a newly emerged plan that the B-boys both agree on: the chorus needs to be at international-qualifying level by the time of the Sept. 26 retreat begins.

That's not some pink-cloud suggestion; it's a quantifiable goal. We need to be singing/performing at a minimum 82 level in the next month. That's about one point higher than we averaged per judge last fall in Wichita.

Here are some specific reminders from the Albuquerque Quid: basses lift all 5ths. Baris lift all 5ths. Leads lift allatime. Tenors be brilliant on roots. Baris can't afford to be lazy, and must produce a consistent richness—to assure the sacred flavor of barbershop. (Maybe dynamite section leader **Grant Hunget** will come up with a "SFBS" button!)

More Biffleisms: basses anticipate the downbeat; think "get to the target sound ahead of the leads." Tuning demands attention and intention, from everyone. Never weight the sound. Hmmm...not much we haven't heard before.

Let's check into the Dwain Domain: Employ a new freedom for "Changes." Strut, enjoy, make the music who you are. Gestures (of their own) are weak; make a statement. Exhibit attitude. Front row, work as a unit and lead the parade.

Lemme add one more to the front row admonition: more is expected of you, because you get more glory in exchange for more responsibility. If you cannot commit to 99 percent attendance—meetings and performance—let me know, because we can find guys who will pay that price. You were chosen for your skills AND your dedication.

Finally, I think it's worth mentioning again what a great group of new members we've gained in recent months. You'd really be impressed if you heard the pre-meeting auditions that have been going on to get these guys into the performing chorus. So wear your nametag (how else they gonna learn 100-plus

names?), greet 'em each week along with your friends—and encourage them as they make the transition into the HOA tradition of excellence.

Remember how hard you had to work when you joined; the bar has been raised since then. And aren't we all glad!

## A VIEW FROM THE TOP

really don't know where to start. I know you all are curious about why my attendance (or lack thereof) Tuesday evenings. I guess an update with all the latest news, both good an bad, would be fitting.

The first significant event indicating a major change in the progress of my cancer occurred in early June. I had my regular appointment with my oncologist where I found out that I could no longer take chemotherapy. The chemo was causing more problems than it was curing. I subsequently had to have two pints of blood to build me back up. There were other indications that the body wasn't fighting back as much. Needless to say this was quite a blow. Right out in front this meant that my life expectancy dropped from maybe years to probably months.

My wife and I had been planning to attend the International convention and right then I made it a goal to get there (and return). To keep along story from getting much longer, I achieved that goal - just barely! We drove my pickup pulling my 5th-wheel trailer up to Montreal-no problems. Took in the convention and contest sessions. Toward the end of the week, I had to vomit my food up. This got worse as the week progressed. We made it home late Tuesday evening after the 4th. I kept getting worse to the point where I could not hold anything down. Finally on the following Monday I went and saw my surgeon. He did a few tests in then sent me straight to the hospital, and scheduled me for surgery Tuesday morning. When I woke up from the surgery, I found out that the outlet from my stomach the intestines had a complete blockage-nothing was getting through. The doctor bypassed the blockage by reconnecting the intestine to the stomach at a different place. My recovery from the surgery has gone fairly well until I started to not be able to hold food down. This time I didn't wait a week before going back. I saw the doctor, he probed on my stomach and sent me straight to the emergency room. At the hospital, they put a tube up my nose and down to the stomach to suck off all the junk in the stomach that was causing such discomfort. Bottom line: Went in on Tuesday, got out Sunday. Tube was in the entire time. By Sunday, the inflammation in the stomach had cleared up and I actually felt good.

Where do we go from here? I hope you all keep me in your prayers. I am now in a Hospice program to assist in whatever is waiting for me in the coming weeks and months.

I plan to keep on doing what I can for as long as I can. I would like to be able to be on the stage in Cedar Rapids this fall when we qualify for International in Louisville. That may be optimistic, but with your prayers I sure am going to try.



The board set this years retreat cost at \$55 per member. This will allow the portion of the retreat costs paid by the chapter to be within the budget. That




amount will be about \$3,000. Music VP **Keith Schweer** told the board that this year the Sunday morning retreat session will actually be a productive session, not merely a social event.







#### Ten Years Ago-September, 1993

HOA was putting the finishing touches on preparation for the CSD fall contest in Des Moines on October 8-10, with the goal of qualifying for the 1994 international competition in Pittsburgh. According to Music VP Ron Abel, the contest songs were to be the same that we used at Calgary: "My Mother's Eves" and "Loading up the Mandy Lee." (Wonder why I can't remember how either one went. Could be it's because I reached the octogenarian plateau of life on the fifth of last May.)

President **John Pennington** reported that the search for a better meeting place, after much hard work on his part, was "now approaching reality." The chapter had been meeting regularly in Room 600 at the Music Hall at 13th and Wyandotte Streets, a place that left something to be desired. Two drawbacks that I recall were the high rental cost and the difficulty in finding an inexpensive parking place. Two months later we moved to our present location at St. Peter's United Church of Christ at 110th Street and Holmes Road in South Kansas City. (Wonder how many of you noticed at that time that your editor was showing it as "St. Charles" church. If you did, why didn't you let the poor sap know so he could get it right, for Pete's sake?)

Our own **John Stucker** became certified as the only contest administrator in the CSD. This action came following an intense four-day seminar on the Society's Contest and Judging Program at DePaul University in Chicago. **Jim Bagby** was to become certified in the new Presentation Category when he took his final in October of that year.

#### Twenty-Five Years Ago -September, 1978

New members included **John Stucker** and his son, **Dave**, both transfers from the Leavenworth chapter. At the time, John was a Civil Service employee at Fort Leavenworth, and the 22 year-old Dave (just think, John, he's 47 now!) was a student at Kansas State University, working on his master's degree and on educational leave from his job as an associate nuclear engineer with Westinghouse. The HOA chapter board okayed the submission of a bid for the 1983 international convention to be held in Kansas City. (It went to Seattle.)

The 1978 CSD fall convention would be hosted by the Kansas City chapter. **Clyde Mensen** was convention chairman, the late **Don Stewart** was chapter president, and **Gil Lefholz** was *Harmonotes* editor (with lots of help from **Donna**).

#### Fifty Years Ago -November 23, 1953

This nearly 50-year-old issue of *Harmonotes* contains a reproduction of a Society membership certificate issued to one **R. Gerald Tanner** in 1940. It was signed by both O.C. Cash and Rupert Hall. Other signatures can't be identified, but the document attests to the fact that Brother Tanner "is 1940 an active member of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America and is entitled to harmonize at any time, day or night, to his heart's desire, subject to the by-laws, rules and regulations of the order and conforming always to the appropriate state laws relating to the public peace." Quite succinct and to the point, don't you think? I can't find my certificate to see how it was worded 38 years ago, but it's around here somewhere.

# THAT DOG WON'T HUNT! (OR WILL HE?) by John Winfiel

On Saturday, Aug. 16 Dwain Brobst told us about the amazing commitment level of the individual members of the Greendale chorus. His comments reminded me of an analogy used by the evangelist at a revival I had attended the night before. The preacher told us he was a rabbit hunter. He told of a time he loaned one of his beagles to his father in law. When his father-in-law returned the dog he said, "You sure have a smart dog there." He ask what his father-in-law meant by that, and was told the dog wouldn't go into the briers to chase out a rabbit, "If you wade into the briars and kick the rabbit out, he'll chase 'em all right. But he's not going to get cut up himself." The preacher questioned us as church members to ask if we were willing to go into the briars to our duty for God, or did we just wait for someone else to risk the jabs and cuts of the briars and only when they had kicked out a "rabbit" did we join in the chase?

I have to ask myself now, am I willing to do the hard work and make the mental commitment necessary to do my best for myself and my chorus at our upcoming district contest? Too often I have sat back while our music and presentation team leaders have gone in the briars after the rabbit named "Quality." I eagerly joined in the chase of

Quality when they put it in front of my nose, but only when it was in the open.



He has given us detailed evaluations of emotional targets appropriate for each phrase of our songs. I have never asked him how many hours he has spent doing this, but I'm sure it would put my feeble efforts to shame. What makes his efforts even more admirable is that he does this work for our benefit, not his own. Just like the beagle who works so hard but never is allowed to eat the rabbit himself, Shawn does all this work for us. Any one who has ever observed Shawn while he is singing knows that he doesn't need those targets himself. He automatically applies those principles long before he puts them on paper for us.

I have long thought that these detailed phrase by phrase emotional targets shouldn't even be necessary for the rest of us. Dwain's comments last Saturday reinforced that opinion. If I and those of you on the risers with me will make the commitment to personalize these songs, we will be able to perform as well as Shawn does without the detailed directions. Of course in order to do this, we must get in the briar patch, we must open ourselves up to emotional risks. We might even get hurt. (God forbid, someone might see us cry!) But somehow the cuts and scrapes don't seem to be such a bother when you have *quality* between your teeth. I remember the exhilarating exhaustion of giving my all emotionally and physically on the international stage. It was great fun!

Dwain also mentioned the physical commitment we need. I have recently found myself sitting and watching others working on the risers far too often. When it is due to aching feet there isn't much I can do about it. But I can do something about the times I become an observer due to tiredness. I can exercise to build my stamina. I can go to bed a little early to get the rest I need. I can eat a healthier diet. I have made the commitment to myself to do these things, and now I'm making that commitment to you. Any one else care to join me and our leaders at the front of the pack? Together we can make short work of any briar patch. Let's not make a few do all the hard work and take all the risks. Let's all work a little harder and we'll all have more fun.


