Harmony University Experience

First of all, a huge *Thank You* to the committee for selecting me as the **Orval Wilson** Harmony University Scholarship winner for 2008. What an experience! I only hope that I can attend again and again. If you have never attended HU, please give it

serious consideration. It is so close and such a resource for you to be able to improve your craft.

This year's HU had the most attendance in a number of years. And to top it off, the average age decreased significantly. That hopefully means the work BHS is doing to generate more interest among the younger set is working. There were many young (high school, college and recent post college) attendees. They certainly added to the overall experience with their enthusiasm to stay up late and sing tags.

I attended HU and participated in the first Extreme Quartet Brigade experience, at Harmony University. For the Brigade experience we had to learn 10 songs and be ready to perform in a quartet without any music. Some of the songs were "If I Only Had A Brain," as performed by *4 Voices*; "Too Marvelous for Words" and "Blue Skies" as sung by *Michigan Jake*; the *Gas House Gang Version* of "Lullaby" and "Mam'selle," as sung by *Vocal Spectrum*.

The Brigade experience did not start until Friday morning, so prior to Friday, I attended classes such as "Music Fundamentals," "Vocal Music Techniques," "How To Be A Great Baritone," "Effective Warm-ups" and "Effective Quartet Rehearsal Techniques." I was very pleased with both class content and instructors. All of the instructors are very experienced with the subject matter they were teaching, as well long time as BHS members. Of the instructors for my classes, only one did not have a quartet or chorus medal of some sort,

and three had quartet and/or chorus gold medals. I learned a lot and am applying it all to my singing. One important thing the experience made me realize.

To get better, we constantly need to learn more. Personally, I need to learn more about the music so that I know when I am on the fifths, thirds and sevenths, I know just how to blend with the other voices, be it a quartet or chorus. So that is my challenge.

When Brigade started in earnest on Friday morning, we were finally able to meet all the participants. Only a handful of us had been there all week. Throughout the week those of us there had formed quartets and sang the songs. It is quite an experience to be able to just put 4 voices together and sing an entire song well. **Brad Dawdy** also attended HU and was a Brigader, so it was fun to be able to sing with him frequently.

They ended up with about 50 Brigade participants. This was quite low for a Brigade weekend. The Atlantic and Indiana Brigade weekends usually attract several hundred. But what we lacked in numbers we certainly made up in enthusiasm.

There are several levels to the Brigade experience. First, you have to qualify. You are given five songs at random, and you have to sing for the song checkers. The rub is one song checker can only qualify you on at most two songs, and they can only qualify two members of the quartet at a time. This process forces you to sing with multiple roups. There is also a contest to see who can sing with the most Brigaders. The winners are the ones that sing with all the participants and prizes are awarded. The most fun is the "contest." Quartets were assigned at random, and two songs were pulled out of a hat. Once the quartets were announced you had about 90 minutes to go practice. Then we had a contest with the top 6 quartets advancing to the finals. While neither my or Brad's quartet made it to the finals, we still had a great time. The weekend ended with the Brigade chorus singing first on the Saturday show. 50 some guys sang a three number *Michigan Jake* set with an hour and a half practice and we sounded like we had been together for years.

So, what did I take away from my HU week? Well, besides what I have already said, the week showed me that the current HOA approach is the correct path to follow. If you learn your music on your own, perfect, so that we do not have to spend rehearsal time learning, then rehearsal time can be spent polishing the performance. Just think how much fun it is to be able to learn a song and be able to sing it extremely well the first time we sing it on the risers. That to me is the epitome of what we should be doing all the time.

THE SATURDAY EVENING POST

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The Saturday Evening Post Features Barbershop Harmony Society

The September/October edition of The Saturday Evening Post (the magazine, not the quartet) has a substantial feature about barbershop music and the Barbershop Harmony Society! Alanna Nash, a well-known music journalist and author who has written a number of biographies, including several about Elvis Presley and Dolly Parton, spent an afternoon at headquarters interviewing Ed Watson, Todd Wilson, and Rick Spencer, and also did a number of phone interviews with Society members. The SEP descended from The Pennsylvania Gazette, which was founded by Benjamin Franklin in 1729. It was first published as a four page newspaper and then as a magazine, and launched the career of artist Norman Rockwell, whose "Barbershop Quartet" cover illustration graces many a member's wall. Prominent editor George Lorimer discovered Rockwell, then 22, in 1916 and commissioned two covers from the unknown artist, as well as an additional 322 cover and numerous illustrations until 1963. TWENTY YEARS AGO: SEPTEMBER, 1988

The "Getting To Know You" column in this issue of *Har-monotes* announced the transfer from the St. Joseph chapter of **Vince and David Perry**. Vince, who has been one of the hardest working and most dedicated members of the Kansas City chapter, had joined the *Pony Expressmen* away back in 1963, and had held most of the chapter offices and had been the chorus manage and show chairman for that outfit. He had also served a stint as Missouri Division vice president for the Central States District. Vince had taught Algebra at Central High School in St. Joseph, and his wife, **Melladee**, also taught at the elementary level. David was a sophomore at Central High School, and had joined the St. Joe chapter only a year earlier. Wonder where he is today, 20 years later.

One of the guests featured in the "Welcome, Guests," column was a fellow by the name of **Monte Duerksen**, who had been a member of the Emporia chapter, with roots that went back to the mid-1950s when he sang with a quartet called the "Spring Singers" out of Colorado Springs. And we all know that Monte may join **Vince Perry** as one of our most valued members. Remember "Singing Valentines?"

THIRTY YEARS AGO: SEPTEMBER, 1978

There's a big gap in my collection of back issues of *Harmonotes* after the August 1968 issue, so I must move this segment up to thirty years ago. Hope that's okay with you.

In the September 1978 issue, I find an article by one **Jeanine Davis** in which she is attempting to form a group of "Teens" to support the efforts of *HOA* to host the CSD convention in October of 1978. Here's her pitch: "This is the year we're gonna bust our buttons with pride for our pops. We're going to show our support by making ourselves available to help in whatever capacity we can (on) Friday and Saturday. We're going to dress similarly to the ("Heartbeats"). Jeanine went on to describe a "Teen Glow" of their own on Saturday evening, with refreshments and music (disco type) to "have in a big room to ourselves to dance or just rap in." Wonder how their plans came off. Perhaps **Jim** can help us.

Guests who were introduced in this issue were the late **John Stucker** and his son, **David**, who transferred from the Leavenworth chapter. John worked as a supervisor in the Civil Servce for the Army at Fort Leavenworth, and David was on educational leave from his job as an associate nuclear engineer with Westinghouse to get a master's degree from Kansas State University. ♥

The Songs We Sing: "I'll Take You Home, Kathleen"

Here they gather around the female lead, Marian Paroo, played by Kate Fisher of New York. It was the third time for Kready to appear in a Starlight production of Meredith Willson's 50-year-old musical, and the second time for Krause. The HOA director and Kready first appeared in 1985 as members of the CSD champion "Special Touch," with Keith Schweer on bass and Bud Clark, now of Joplin, on bari.

The dancers were losing several pounds per performance — and smiling all the while. The principal actors from the east coast complained more about having to drive on I-435 to their Overland Park hotel the one night we had heavy enough rain to wash out the play. In New York, they are not used to (a) driving, (b) freeways (c) 6-inch rains or (d) 18-wheelers rushing by as if it were dry, swamping the small rental cars of white-knuckled out-of-staters.


Dick Van Dyke and *The Vantastix* have an eclectic new a cappella album, *Put on a Happy Face.* Van Dyke was inducted into the Society as an honorary member in 1999 and actively supports barbershop music and youth music education. *The Vantastix* quartet formed in 2000 in Malibu, after **Mike Mendyke** ran into Dick in a Starbucks and struck up a conversation about

music, which led to many impromptu writing sessions around Van Dyke's piano. Quartet members **Bryan Chadima** and **Eric Bradley** are West Coast musicians with impressive musical pedigrees.

Mendyke, a former NASA engineer who also has a degree in music, founded a barbershop quartet called *Local Cheese*, who joined the Society as **Frank Thorne** members and won the 1991 Northeast District 6 championship. At the time, they were one of the youngest quartets competing, and they performed throughout New England.

The album contains 12 songs recorded in Chadima's Venice studio, including such well-known children's favorites as "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang," "You've Got a Friend in Me" from the movie Toy Story and "Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious," as well as standards such as "Put on a Happy Face" and "High Hopes." Thrown in are a couple of bonus Christmas songs. Chadima arranges most of the The Vantastix material.
