

# HARMONY COLLEGE

When I went to the campus of Missouri Western State College in St. Joseph at the end of July to attend Harmony College for a week, I didn't know what I was in for, but I knew it would be fun and educational. After listening to Lee Tubbs, Dan Bowser, Joe Mathieu, and Duane Lawson talk about their prior experiences there, I knew I had to go and see for myself. I wasn't disappointed.

I was one of some 700 attendees there, from all over the world. Most of them were barbershoppers and barbershop chorus directors, but there were also some music educators and some high school ensembles in attendance. We all got together the first night for some singing and a keynote address from **Val Hicks**, 50-year society guy and arranger (he arranged the Ballpark song we're doing, among many others). He talked about several past "heroes" of our society who have made it what it is today, and finished with a "keep-it-barbershop" admonition. For me, his address set the tone for the week.

When we had pre-registered for the week, we had 50-plus classes to chose from, ranging from music theory to vocal techniques to stagecraft to physics (yes, physics) to writing and arranging. The Director's College that was in session simultaneously had another large list of coarse offerings. All these classes were taught by the very best teachers the society has to offer. There must have been about 75 faculty members. They filled a whole set of risers at one time. I recognized most of their names, either from the Kenosha home office, or as arrangers, or quartetters, or contest judges. I narrowed my class selection to *Arranging I, Vocal Techniques, How to be a Great Baritone, Physics of Sound,* and *Tag Singing.* 

By far, my most enjoyable and educational experience was in the Vocal Techniques class taught by **Dave Calland**, the lead of *Uptown Sound* and director of *The Alliance Chorus* from Ohio. He took a rag-tag bunch of barbershoppers (about 35 of us) and turned us into a district champion level chorus by the end of the week, giving every member of the class a one-on-one voice lesson that lasted five to ten minutes along the way. He did a masterful job of helping us find our best voice and to optimize our resonance.

In terms of the more nitty-gritty learning, the arranging class with **Tom Parker** was well-suited to my personal hope to do some basic arranging. We started each day singing a tag, which we then dissected. Then

we got into chord recognition, understanding the underlying harmonic structure of a song, the circle for 5ths, voicings, leadings, what makes a song contestable, etc. I can now speak with authority on the subject of Chinese 7ths!

The other classes were great as well. **Dave Krause** did a great job with the tag singing class, with a surprise guest each day to teach a tag. **Dr. Greg Lyne** came to one class and tried to teach a tag by ear. When the class didn't get the parts right off, he decided we needed the notes written out for us on the chalk board. He wrote the notes as he taught, with incredible speed, always writing one note ahead of where we were singing, while simultaneously singing the prior note with the class. I don't know if I can explain just how amazing that was to see. The man is a genius!

Dan'l Bowser has talked to us before about the experience of singing with 700 men at the general sessions each morning. We were issued ten or twelve pieces of music when we arrived, and sang through them throughout the week. At times I would stop singing and just listen to the amazing sound. More than once I quit singing involuntarily due to a big lump in my throat and, as Dan'l puts it, "moisture leaving my body." That's an experience I hope to duplicate in years to come at future Harmony Colleges.

It was fun to participate in the well-established traditions while there. I could've done without the beanies, however. The tag-singing until all hours, the ice cream feeds, the beanie chorus contest, etc. added a lot of fun to the week. I strongly feel that every member of our chorus would benefit greatly from attending at least one harmony college. The social element is, of course, very worthwhile. But having a week of concentrated learning about how to hone your craft and become a better chorus member and/or quartetter is the most valuable aspect of the experience. I urge every member to

consider taking a week off one summer to get a "shot-in-the-arm" for this hobby we love.



### WHERE DO I FIT IN MY CHAPTER?

The Tag-a-long - This guy goes a long with anything the Leader says, does what ever the Hobbyist wants to do and just tags a long with the Chapter flow.

What is your Chapter attitude and where do you fit in?

Take a long look at your Chapter, see if you can recognize any of the above member types. Now ask yourself, "Where do I fit in?" Is there room for improvement?

A chapter full of competitors is a chapter that wants to go to a national convention. And why not!? In our lifetime, how many opportunities do we get to do something that really makes a difference. 
