Can we take 80 or 90 guys to Topeka this October? Answer: Sure we can. But only if everyone participates in the recruitment of new members!!

Our quartet, the *Merry Mugs*, flew to most out-of-town engagements in a nice plane piloted by **Joe Weaver**. (After squiring us around on several




After one Iowa engagement we encountered a bad batch

GENTLEMEN OF NOTE ENROLL IN ARTISTRY 101 AT HARMONY COLLEGE

Two Seniors (Jon and I-first timers) became Freshmen, and two Veterans (Rick and Rodfourth timers) became our "in house counselors" at Harmony College, where the faculty of super stars of barbershop harmony shared their unlimited



knowledge with all attendees, creating literally hundreds of "emotional highs", then sending us home with chords ringing in our ears!

Our coaches, each an expert and certified judge in a specific category, helped us "overhaul" our contest and show songs. They installed "unique parts" that will revitalize their believability and musicality as we perfect them.


So, <u>will you</u>—do <u>we</u>—notice a difference? *Artistry?* Is this just another "dazzle 'em with your footwork expression? How does this apply to our hobby?

Actually "Artistry" is simply:

- ...the difference between a "C" and an "A" score in a contest.
- ...four people expressing lyrics and notes with voice and body in beautiful harmony to produce the meaning as well as the emotion of the music for the <u>singers</u> and <u>listeners</u>,
- ...performing <u>above</u> the level of mechanics. How do we attain artistry? PERFECT THE BASICS!
 - Manage breath to support the thoughts.
 - Sing in tune maintain tonal center throughout the song.
 - Balance all chords.
 - Match all target vowels.
 - Energize every phrase ending.
 - -Move <u>every</u> thought forward to maximize the meaning of the phrase.
 - Sing all word sounds.
 - involve your body and face to strengthen the lyrics and music.
 - Start and stop together.
 - Agree, agree, agree.
 - Allow the mechanics that produced a *perfect rehearsal* provide for a *perfect performance*.

Members of International quartet champs told us at Harmony College that they spend at least 30 minutes per rehearsal "perfecting the basics". Professionals,...namely **Barbara Streisand** or **Frank Sinatra** have rehearsed a phrase 30 or 40 times before a performance to produce what they wished to convey to their audience.

Was Harmony College profitable? Will the *Gentlemen of Note* exhibit ascending levels of artistry? Watch and listen.

PRESIDENTS' HELPERS FUND

It is that time of the year when several things happen. With the Retreat and Fall Contest coming up, the costs of enjoying our hobby suddenly take a major leap upwards. For old hands and those whose job situations are stable and predictable, this becomes mostly a matter of budgeting and planning. For others who are newer to our hobby or whose job situations are new or less stable, planning and budgeting will help but may not make it possible for them to attend. And this is even more true for students. It was to deal with these special financial circumstances that a number of years ago the *Presidents' Helpers Fund* was established through the generosity of a number of veteran members including some Past-Presidents. This fund was to assist—on a need basis—those men who wanted to attend, or buy their uniform, or go to contests but were financially unable to foot the whole bill. The Fund helped them out in as anonymous a way as possible—usually by way of a word from their section leader or the Music VP to me or to the current President when the Music Team learned that someone could not participate because of costs. We would figure out what would make the difference and would fund it from the Fund. We will be doing some of that again this year. Those who benefit from the fund are not required to pay back what they get but are encouraged to do so if and when it becomes possible. And some have.

The second thing is that we are now approaching the end of the third quarter of the year and the Fund is being drawn down at a time when it needs a boost. It is not too early to think of a tax deductible contribution to the Chapter in the form of a donation to the *Presidents' Helpers Fund*. I know that there are a few regular donors out there who can be counted on as well as several quartets. It does not take a big donation to make a difference as several small ones add up to a helpful amount to those eager to join in our efforts but unable for reasons beyond their control at this point to afford to do so.

So this article is to ask two things: (1) Any member of the chorus planning to NOT go to the retreat or contest because of their costs, see your section leader or the

Music VP. We will see if we can help. (2) Any member who would like to make a donation to the Fund, all you need to do is write a check in whatever amount you wish to contribute, make it payable to Kansas City Chapter, S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A.,

and in the memo area write:

"Presidents' Helpers Fund". Get it to me or to **Charles Ramirez**, our Chapter Treasurer, and we will do the rest. Thanks for your help.

The farmer crosses one leg over the other and drawls, "Why, I'm surprised you don't recognize me. I've been married to your sister for 36 years!"




A LOOK AT THE PAST IN THE HARMONOTES

DIRECTOR'S COLLEGE 2001 by Mike Neff

What a summer it's been! After an incredible trip to Nashville for the International Contest, I was lucky enough to attend Director's College last month for another great week of barbershopping.

As a first year attendee at Director's College, I didn't quite know what to expect, but it was AMAZING. Prior to attending, we had to submit a videotape of ourselves directing. The staff in Kenosha reviewed the tapes and assigned

the students to various classes at Director's College based on their tapes.

I took several courses on Directing and Vocal Techniques. **Dr. Greg Lyne** taught my Directing Techniques class. It was *AWESOME*. We spent the week talking about leadership as directors, motivating the chorus to sing and perform better, bringing out the best in every singer, and creating the best possible scenario for musical success. It would be hard to put into words all that I learned in that class, but I feel very fortunate to have spent a week with Dr. Greg. He is a tremendous talent and you just can't help but want to sing well for him. He brings that out of every singer.

I also had a course on Sound Management with **Bill Biffle.** Bill is a Singing Judge from Albuquerque, and sings with the chorus there. We talked extensively about vocal production, tone quality, breathing technique and voice placement. It was a great class and we tried many different techniques and procedures in class, which really helped

illustrate the methods he was trying to teach us.












Theory II was the toughest class for me. But, thankfully, I can now identify chord structures, roots, thirds, fifths, diminished chords, augmented chords, major chords and minor chords. I can't do it as fast as "that **Bruce Wenner** guy," but I can work through them and figure them out now. **Kirk Young**, Society Music Specialist taught that class.

The other classes I took were on Performance, Leadership and "On To the Rehearsal." All of them offered a number of techniques and insights into making us into better directors.


