




CHORUS AND QUARTET SINGING IN THE BARBERSHOP STYLE


Quartet, Chorus Contests, CD Occupy HOA

It Is My Responsibility

Discipline is training that is designed to develop a specific skill or behavior. Discipline can be external that comes from the top down or outside in as one would find in a military style organization. Discipline can also be internal that

comes from within an individual or group as one would find in a very democratic style organization or an individual working hard to develop his/her skills at playing the piano. An individual or group is said to have good self discipline if they choose to do one particular thing to pursue a goal even though at the time they actually would prefer to do some thing else. The choice of which style of discipline might be most effective would depend on the activities and mission of the organization or individual.



The Barbershop Harmony Society and *The Heart of America Chorus* are democratic organizations. Its members choose to join. They choose to abide by the rules and support the mis-

sion. They choose the degree to which they participate in the activities, work and responsibilities. Being the type of organization that we are in *HOA*, the most effective style of discipline for us is that which comes from within. Peer example, support and pressure are our tools. It is not the responsibility of the directors to maintain discipline on the risers. It is the responsibility of every individual on the risers. On several occasions in recent months, we have been criticized for our lack of group discipline on the risers. In general, we have acknowledged that our group discipline is not as good as it should be and that we would like to see it improve.

The board has asked **Rich Huyck** to chair a committee of board and music team members to come up with recommendations to improve riser discipline that can be ready to introduce to our membership at our retreat in September. Improving the way that we work on the risers is a challenge for all of us. We as individuals must change some of the ways that we do things and get rid of some bad habits. It will not be easy and the results will not be achieved over night. If we are supportive, determined and patient, improvement will come. Working together, we will succeed and be a better organization for it. \heartsuit

Who is Moving Up? Who is Fading? by Jim Porter

The first consideration in any contest cycle when comparing scores between contests is how strict was the judging panel? The panel at Indianapolis was an easy one, especially kind to the top performers. The average score for the top 10 choruses was more than 2.8% higher than the average for the same choruses at their district contests last fall. For the second 10, the improvement vanished. The average scores at Indy were 0.6% BELOW the averages from last fall. The remaining eight choruses (excluding the BABS and SNOBS choruses, who lacked fall scores for comparison) were over 2.5% lower at Indy than last fall. Heart of America was down 0.5% from last fall, which proved to be normal for the choruses in the same range of scores.

Movement among the choruses is very rare in this competition, but this was a rare competition. Anyone who was there was blown away by the incredible performance of the Westminster, CA, chorus, who was competing for the first time on International stage. What an introduction! They almost, but not quite, knocked off the Dallas Vocal Ma*jority*, improving their spring score by a HUGE margin of 7.3%. Vocal Majority needed to raise their score by 2.5% to hold onto the trophy. Westminster's score was higher than the Masters of Harmony posted last year in Salt Lake City. For the Vocal Majority, it was their closest call since 1994, when they scored 2813 (compared to 2838 this year) and won by 20 over New Tradition Chorus. VM's score matched their 2003 winning score, but was below their scores in 1997 and 2000. (Scores prior to 1994 are not comparable to current scores. However, Vocal Majority won easily in 1985, 1988 and 1991.)

Another new chorus in the hunt is Atlanta Vocal Project, who finished 10th in their first year on stage, improving their spring score by 3.8%. The other major gainer was the one who closed the competition with an incredible

Among the quartets, the judging panel in Indianapolis was also very receptive of the best. The top 10 quartets all posted higher results that they did in the spring prelims, and the average was over 2% higher. For the quartets further down, this margin disappeared. The Indy panel scored the 2nd 10 quartets only 1% higher, and the rest were no higher than the spring.

Vocal Spectrum improved an astounding 5.5% to win the gold medal. Max Q gave them a run for it, improving their score 3.7%. Others to watch for: Wheelhouse (up 3.6% to finish 5th) and State Line Grocery (up 2.5%, 7th, only their second time on stage). Two other up-and-comers are Four Aces and The *Allies*, both competing for the first time at International, finishing 12th and 13th respectively. Four Aces improved their spring scores 5.0% (their Thursday set was 85%, 6th place overall), and The Al*lies* were up 2.7%. Another comer is *Hot* Air Buffoons, who improved their spring score 4.0% and finished 16th. TEN YEARS AGO: SEPTEMBER 1996:

Remember "Operation Harold Hill?" Probably not. I didn't, either, but I'll bet **Monty Duerksen** does. "Operation Harold Hill" was a member recruitment program devised by the So-

ciety to be implemented by each chapter over the first six months of 1996. The goal for each chapter was 20 new members recruited by June 30 with a minimum of one new member per month. And, of course, Monty Duerksen, in his capacity as membership vice president, was the guy whose responsibility it was to see that the Kansas City chapter achieved those goals.

Well, you know Monty. Give him a goal to achieve, and then get out of his way! The September 1996 *Harmonotes* doesn't reveal just how many new members were brought aboard, but Monty's efforts resulted in a congratulatory letter from **Ev Nau**, Society manager of membership development, to President **Don Young** advising him that our chapter had won a silver medal for bringing in 20 new members, plus the "Marathon Award" for signing up a new member in each of the six months. Ev also reported that the total result Society-wide during "Operation Harold Hill" was 2,906 new members.

TWENTY YEARS AGO: SEPTEMBER, 1986

Don't know whether it was due to some kind of virus that swept through the chapter membership or the enthusiastic approach Membership Vice President **Ed Ward** applied to his duties, but the first six months of 1986 were also a period of vigorous membership growth. At the beginning of the year, Ed had established a motto, "26 in '86." But by the end of August, he had brought on board 28 new singers, and had revised his motto to, "36 in '86."

An item in the September *Harmonotes* indicates that during the 31-day period (which should have included at least four Tuesday night meetings) from July 22 through August 19, 13 of the 18 visitors were either former members (3), became new members (5) or current members from other chapters (5).

FORTY YEARS AGO: SEPTEMBER, 1966

Not much news to report, so Editor **Don Thorne** had a lot of fun explaining how to adapt a white shirt so as to accommodate the paper dickey and collar that went with the uniform that was worn by chorus members at the time. I wasn't a member in 1966, but I do recall that the uniform looked exactly like an outfit I wore as a teen-aged usher in a theater in my hometown of Oshkosh, WI. Don very carefully instructed the members to ask their wives to remove the collar of a white shirt and add the two buttons needed to secure the paper collar. I had a better solution. I wore no shirt at all under the dickey. \checkmark

Irving Berlin was born on May 11, 1888, in Tyumen, Siberia (or possible Mogilev, now Belarus). He was an American composer and lyricist, one of the most prodigious and famous American songwriters in history. Berlin got his start as a lyricist for other composers, and although he never learned how to play a piano or read music beyond a rudimental level, he wrote over 3,000 songs.

About half of Berlin's works became popular on Broadway and in Hollywood, leaving an indelible mark on American music and culture with hits such as "God Bless America," "White Christmas," "Alexander's Ragtime Band" and "There's No Business Like Show Business." Berlin produced 17 film scores and 21 Broadway scores in addition to his individual songs. ♥

It was their second week with that music, and they are expected to be off the spots the next week, when Greg Clancy comes to coach them. 
Fundraiser Update!
