12th Street Rag Says Goodbye After 14 Years

t was 14 years ago this past July when John and Mark Fortino returned from Calgary after watching the Gas House Gang win the International Quartet Championship. They were so pumped up; they just knew they had to form a new quartet. That very August, 1993, with Rick Kready on tenor and Keith Schweer on bass, 12th Street Rag was born. That October, 12th Street Rag placed third the Central States District convention and won the District Championship the following year in 1994. The Spring of 1994 started a string of International appearances that would continue for nearly a decade and a half with Micah Jeppesen (tenor) and Barry Moore (bass) stepping in to "carry the torch" in 1997 and 1998, respectively. It has truly been a dream come true and a lifetime experience that we will never forget.

12th Street Rag had several goals. The first and most important was to sing and perform at a high level – shooting for top 10 and then some. We always joked that, based on our rate of improvement, we would get our Gold Medal by the time we were eligible for the Seniors Contest. From 1994 through 2007 the placements went like this: 36th, 36th, 37th, 34th, 43rd, 27th, 17th, 23rd, 21st, 15th, 11th, 15th, 11th and 15th. Anyone want to bet that if we stayed together, we'd be 11th in 2008?

The second goal was to impact audiences and individuals in a way that they would be truly entertained. We were so blessed to

have performed in 25 of the 50 states and Canada and to have had the chance to get to know some wonderful people.

Then, of course, the youth movement was a mission of ours from the beginning. Over the years we performed at numerous youth events, school tours and had the privilege of singing and working with over 10,000 kids during our tenure. In 2003, we were honored as a quartet by being named the Central States District Barbershopper of the Year for our work with the youth.

The emotion that we feel at this time is impossible to describe. We have been friends for nearly a decade and walking away from this quartet is not a decision we have made lightly.

So why end it? It's not a personality conflict like you hear about in a lot of quartet endings, although John can be a pain in the... uh, never mind. It's not because John and Mark's uncle **Luigi** was going to put cement overshoes on Barry and Micah if we didn't win the Gold. It's not because Micah and Barry never could learn to do the "sign-ofthe-cross"...because they tried VERY hard to do it...really...they did. It's not because everyone always thought Barry was the best-looking guy in the quartet because we sang for a lot of blind audiences...or was that blind judges...or was that deaf judges? No. Although those would be all have been good reasons to break up, the real reason is pretty simple. Our most important goal was to sing and perform at the highest level, with continual improvement. Although we continually improved over the years it became apparent that we had reached a plateau.

When we compared that level of achievement to the 10 years of wear on this three-state quartet, we came to the realization that it was time. But, it was not a no-brainer. It was extremely difficult to break up.

If we all lived in the same city, it would make it much easier to continue, and we think we would still be together today. One interesting thing is that man-for-man, each of us feel that what we accomplished was remarkable - that we were able to keep it together this long with Barry flying from St. Louis to Kansas City (thank God for Southwest Airlines) and Micah driving six hours round trip from Omaha to Mark's house to practice several times a month—and sometimes every week during contest preparations. Although we are officially announcing our retirement, we plan to honor our show commitments. We are currently booked through 2008, but don't plan to accept any further shows at this time.

It is not possible to thank everyone who touched the 12th Street Rag family over 14 years, as there were so many. However, there are some people who were really almost a part of our quartet. Our special fifth quartet members along the way were: Jim Bagby (lifetime friend and coach); the late Harriet Gall (vocal coach in the early days of 12th Street); Al Higgins (for all the school tours he put together over all 14 years); **Joe Connelly** (who got us into the top 20 for the first time in 2000); **Bill Biffle** (our sugar-coat everything – "wish he would just cut to the point" vocal coach for the past seven years); Brandon Guyton (new to us this last year but one of the major reasons for our high scores at prelims and an indescribable talent); Mike Slamka (whose friendship and guidance has been immeasurable—oh yeah and great coach, too - "every word with purpose"), and **Cindy Hansen**, without whom we would have never had two 11th-place finishes. Finally, there has been a guy behind the scenes whose contribution to our success has been enormous. That man is **Chuck Ames**, fellow *Heart of America Chorus* singer and keeper of the keys of Platte Woods United Methodist Church near the Kansas City International Airport. The availability of a rehearsal location so close to the airport was critical to our success. Chuck, as they say, "thanks for the use of the hall" and thanks for your friendship.

To the *Freemont Pathfinders, Ambassadors of Harmony*, and *Heart of America* choruses, we thank you for your undying support. Over the years we were honored to be a part of your chapter shows and to be one of your chapter quartets. Your friendship and encouragement will never be forgotten.

It is not possible to express our gratitude to our wives. **Carolyn** and **Kim** allowed Micah and Barry to be gone week after week for 10 years for rehearsal in Kansas City. For 14 years, **Leann** scheduled and rescheduled monthly trips to her family farm in western Kansas around the quartet shows, coaching sessions etc. For 10 years, **Sarah** has been running a hotel, changing beds, putting out fresh towels etc. so that Micah and Barry would have a comfortable place to sleep each week. Ladies all we can say is we love you with all that we are, and we thank you for making our dreams come true.

If there is one thing that has been a constant in our lives it has been the support of the Central States District and the friends that we have made throughout the country. As we began calling our show commitments to let them know of our decision, we were reminded of **Jim Henry's** keynote address at Harmony University. While it is true they never hung a Gold Medal around our necks, so many of you have reminded us over and over of the buckets of Gold Medal moments we have shared with you over the past 14 years. Right to the end, you all have supported us and continue to support us even through this retirement. The Lord has truly blessed us with each one of you. Thanks for the many memories that we shared; they will never be forgotten. \blacktriangledown

Harmony Foundation Report

Note that we will have our raffle each time we meet in our regular location. Half of the proceeds are designated to Harmony Foundation. PLEASE NOTE that the Board is considering alternatives for the funds raised for Harmony Foundation. The following is from

an E-Mail from **Duane Lawson**, who is proposing a change.

Background- I have been asked by the district to be the Collegiate Quartet Liaison and work with the District Youth in Harmony VP. When working with chapters across the district, there are chapters that would like to get involved, but may not have the funds or resources to get started. An example I used in the meeting was when I was the CSD Young Men in Harmony VP and helped Topeka, KS start an event. I helped them write a grant through Sweet Adelines and assisted through the district funds. In trying to write a grant through Harmony Foundation, it was during a period when they had decided that they were not going to accept grant applications.

Don't get me wrong. I am a big fan of the Harmony Foundation. But, I will be approaching all chapters to consider using some of the funds that have already been set aside to go to Harmony Foundation, and sending directly to the Central States District Youth In Harmony Fund. In my opinion, it will give a "local" resource to help out when grants or chapter funds are shy in funding an event and cuts out the one of the middle men.

As of Wednesday, August 22nd, and 40 drawings: The total raised for Harmony Foundation in the past month is \$207. The total raised for this year (since Nov. 14, 2006) is \$1,740. Last year, the total raised to this point was \$4,077. In 2005, the total raised to this point was \$1,919. ♥

Interesting Time of Year for HOA by Jim Bagby, Lame Duck Arm-Waver

This is an unusual time for the *Heart* of *America Chorus*, from a number of perspectives.

For one thing, I can't remember the last time we changed one of our competition numbers between the July international and the October district contest. But that's how confident we are (a) in our members ability to devote themselves to the learning process and (b) the appeal of the new/old ballad.

It doesn't hurt that our section leaders, AKA "New and Used Parts," did an exceptional job of laying down the tracks for "That Old Quartet of Mine," a classic Lou Perry arrangement with a tag given a little juice by our own Dr. Bruce Wenner. Carter Combs, Mike Neff, Grant Hunget and Keith Schweer spent an intense evening in front of Mark Fortino's microphones, making sure that not only is every note perfect, but so is the interpretation, color and shading that the chorus will sing. That recording work is just part of the great support and help I get from these four guys and new bari section leader Al Fehlauer.

And then, of course, Mark did his usual masterful job of mixing and producing the final product. In fact, he had the MP3 files to Vince Perry for posting on the *HOA* Web site by the next day—and **Mike O'Dell** had burned enough learning CD's to have them available to members by the following Tuesday. The result is that by the time you read this, we'll be off paper and well into the performing. And my prediction is that OQ will score AT LEAST as well as "Time after Time" would have come Oct. 20 at the Music Hall.

And if it doesn't, I think you should fire the director.

That's obviously another thing that's different these days: I keep thinking of "last time" moments or events, which is a weird feeling. Being in a transition period, wondering who the new director will be, probably is a little odd for all of us and (I hope), exciting at the same time.

It's also an unusual time because in one of the metro area's worst heat waves ever, we're already singing holiday songs. But as soon as the CSD competition is over, we'll jump headlong into preparations for the Dec. 1 holiday shows. Look elsewhere in this issue for the full list of songs we'll sing, and the eight-parters with the Kansas City Sweet Adelines, who by then could well be world champeen gold medalists! It will be, as always, one of the highlights of the year. Don't forget, we're looking for soloists to audition for "Do You Hear What I Hear?" It's a rangy trio, but not restricted to any particular voice part. See me or Bro. Neff if you're interested.

It will be a special show for me with the Rural Route 4 joining Zing! as headliners. It's only the second show we will have done this year, and the first with Don Kahl on tenor. I hope you'll plan to be in the HOA chorus for the December performances—and not just because it will be the last time I'll be your arm-waver. Bruce has done a new eight-part arrangement of "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" that I know you'll relish. Dr. Burt Szabo, arranger of another new one for us this year, "The Night Before Christmas," as well as "My Pretty Little Jesus" (one of my all-time favorites) has been invited to attend the shows. We're keeping such chorus favorites as "Joy to the World" and "O Holy Night," so it should be just a great singing experience for all of


Before I totally ramble away, I want to thank some others I've not mentioned. Mike Louque and Jerry Garrard have become valuable additions to the music team. Mike's creative "Runnin' Wild" staging was a key part to the mid-A scores we received from some judges (and I thought should have been more)

in Denver, and he's working on upgrading the package for this fall. **John Fortino's** coaching was always helpful, and although he's not active with *HOA* now, we hope to be able to count on him occasionally in the future. I don't know of any harder-working person in the chapter than **Mike Schumacher**, whether it's with extra staging sessions or any other job you ask of him. **Don Young** and **Jerry Meier** also have provided invaluable organization with the front row, and **John Landry** works behind the camera and behind the scenes.

Dan Henry made the RW train, and **Marty Oldehoeft** is redoing it for district with **Bob Howard.** It got a little derailed and bent on the trip west.

Finally, let me suggest that few CSD quartets, including the gold medalists, have had as much impact over the years as 12th Street Rag. Certainly, few quartets have made more friends or been a more audience-friendly, popular show quartet, in each of their combinations. Lou Perry used to say "The audience looks into your eyes and decides if they believe you." That where so many speakers, ministers, comedians, singers and quartets fail.

I was leafing through an old church hymnal at my son's bible camp and ran across this text. I thought it was interesting, and would be a nice newsletter filler item." You're right! Thanks, Niel!

From "John Wesley's Select Hymns," 1761

Learn these tunes before you learn any others. Afterwards, learn as many as you please.

Sing them exactly as they are printed here, without altering or mending them at all. And if you have learned to sing otherwise, unlearn it as soon as you can.

Sing all. See that you join with the congregation as frequently as you can. Let not a slight of weakness or weariness hinder you. If it is a cross to you to take it up, you will find it a blessing.

Sing lustily and with a good courage. Beware of singing as if you were half dead, or half asleep but lift up your voice with strength. Be no more afraid of your voice now, nor more ashamed of its being heard, than when you sung the songs of Satan.

Sing modestly. Do not brawl, so as to be here, and reward you when heard above or distinct from the rest of in the clouds of heaven. ♥

the congregation, that you may not destroy the harmony; but strive to unite your voices together so as to make one clear melodious sound.

Sing in time. Whatever time is sung be sure to keep with it. Do not run before nor stay behind it; but attend close to the leading voices, and move therewith as exactly as you can; and take care not to sing too slow. This drawling way naturally steals on all who are lazy; and it is high time to drive it out from us, and sing all our tunes just as quick as we did at first.

Above all sing spiritually. Have an eye to God in every word you sing. Aim at pleasing him more than yourself, or any other creature. In order to do this attend strictly to the sense of what you sing, and see that your heart is not carried away with the song, but offered to God continually. So shall your singing be such as the Lord will approve here, and reward you when he cometh in the clouds of heaven.

Adam Droegemaeller, from Lee's Summit. His work schedule and travel schedule does not permit him to become a member at this time.


Dave Baehr, from Overland Park, KS has been with us two times and is a guest of **Gordy Coleman**.

FRIENDS: Would knock on your door.


BARBERSHOP FRIENDS: Walk right in and say, "I'm

TEN YEARS AGO: SEPTEMBER, 1997:

Not having a September 1997 issue of *Harmonotes* to search for news for this segment, I peaked into the October 1997 edition to see if I could find something there. Once again, as has

happened numerous times since I've been an *HOA* member, the contents of that issue were overwhelmingly indicative of what can be expected of a large, active, highly motivated and well-managed chapter.

Right there on the front page was an item by **Mike Neff**, who was co-chairman for *HOA*, announced the coming of the "Holiday Harmony Spectacular," the very first collaborative Christmas show with the Kansas City Sweet Adelines to be held on December 6 at the RLDS Auditorium in Independence. This performance has been an annual presentation ever since.

Then **Don Peck** filed a story about the great success of the fourth annual *HOA* retreat at the Mount Conference Center in Atchison, Kansas, on September 12-14. The coaches were **Marty Lovick**, a Presentation judge and a member of the Harmony College faculty, and former *HOA* member, **Don Kahl**, also a former *HOA* member, at that time a four-time gold medalist (with the *Vocal Majority*) and tenor with the international champion *Rural Route 4*.

And that's not all! There's an account of a trip by the *HOA* chorus to Manhattan, Kansas, to be part of the show scheduled after the first CSD Southwest Division preliminary quartet contest. Seventy-four singers piled into two buses for the trip. Author **Don Peck** explains, "By all accounts, this very first quartet preliminary in the new format was a success." Did I miss something? Wasn't the division or-

ganization of the district discontinued some time before this event took place? Apparently it wasn't considered that much of a success because the system is no longer used. Am I right or wrong?

To my recollection, it was the only time that a Bagby-directed HOA chorus ever placed lower than second place. But it was close; the "Barberboys" of St. Joseph beat them by only nine points.

TWENTY YEARS AGO: SEPTEMBER, 1987

You know, I don't ever remember this one. *The Heart of America Chorus*—my chorus—was booked for a show at the Granada Theater in Kansas City, KS, on September 12. The theme was "Quartets...and All that Jazz," with the *New Red Onion Jazz Babies*, the *Rural Route 4*, the *Jubilee Transfer, Just Friends* and "**Dr. Marvin Faulwell** at the Magnificent Grand Barton Organ." I couldn't have forgotten it, because I put a bill that occupied an entire page in MY bulletin! Did anybody see me there? I'll cry myself to sleep tonight.

FORTY YEARS AGO: SEPTEMBER, 1967

On the last page, away down in the lower right-hand corner, almost forgotten, is a small announcement of the passing of **Edgar E. Schlieb** on August 17. Eddie was a member of the Kansas City chapter for 27 years, during which he founded the *Gamboliers* and sang lead with that quartet for many years. \blacktriangledown

The Songs We Sing

compiled by Wade Dexter Source: A History of Popular Music in America by Sigmund Spaeth

I've had this book more than 50 years; it was copyrighted in 1948. I guess it was a gift from someone, but I read very little of it until recently when I began writing this column. Correct me if I'm wrong, but I'm quite sure that **Sigmund Spaeth** was a Barbershopper himself.

Anyway, in this book, which contains a review of what must be hundreds of popular songs and their composers and publishers, I found the following words on page 363:

Barbershop harmonizers may be surprised to hear that their piece de resistance, "I Had a Dream, Dear" (correctly titled, "You Tell Me Your Dream, Dear) was originally a waltz song dealing with innocent children, far from the heman style of most modern interpreters. The words were by **Seymour A. Rice** and **Al H.Brown**, and the composer . . . was Charles N. Daniels, better known as Neil Moret. (See page 314.) The 1908 version showed many variants in both words and music, as compared with what is sung today by male quartets and convivial harmonizing groups. An entirely different set of lyrics was supplied later by Gus Kahn, the original writers losing their copyright by failing to renew it. The most popular modern arrangement of "You Tell Me Your Dream" brings in an additional chorus of patter and spelling effects ("m-i-n-e," "t-h-i-n-e," "b-e-s-t," "r-e-s-t," etc.), and a "tag" ending with elaborate chromatic progressions. (James A. Leyden deserves the chief credit for these embellishments.)

Remember, this book was written in the late 1940s. ♥
