Ol' **Bruce** had to have his knee doctored...again. Messed it up when he was less OLD.





RR4 Loses Founding Partner

In the first few hours of the glorious haze after the *Rural Route 4* won at Salt Lake City in 1986, a fellow came up to me and said, "Hi, I'm **Frank** from Chicago, and I need to talk to you about the Society cruise." We knew that the champs got a week's cruise, but since we had never discussed the possibility of winning, obviously we hadn't talked about any cruise.

My immediate reaction was that **Calvin and Willard Yoder**, dairy farmer partners, had never been away from the milking operation more than a few days together in their lives — during international convention week — and a nine-day cruise would be out of the question. I started to say that when a voice behind me jumped in: "Yes, we're going!" It was **Mary Yoder**, beaming from ear to ear.

And with nine neighbors, relatives and hired hands pitching in while we were gone to the Caribbean, that trip became one of the highlights of the *RR4* family history.

Another highlight occurred a couple of weeks ago on Aug. 19, when Mary ended her six-year battle with cancer. She was 62. Her funeral the following Monday at the Sycamore Grove Mennonite Church in Garden City, Mo., down the road from the Yoder farm, was an amazing celebration of music, scripture and an outpouring of love for a life well spent. Her gravesite is in the Clearfork Cemetery, for which the Yoder family has served as groundskeepers for three generations. It's a stone's throw east of Calvin and Mary's house.

Mary's proudest accomplishment is her children, **Wes and Gwen**, and then at age 44, twins **Cindy and Mindy**. Wes was born the year the *RR4* formed in 1971, Gwen

two years later. In 1990, Wes became our tenor when **Don Kahl** retired. Wes and Don both sang with the quartet during the funeral and at the family gathering afterward. (Late in the visitation, so did original baritone **Rufus Kenagy**). Gwen's husband, **Chris Meeks**, is a former Kansas City Chapter member and now sings with Metro Kansas City.

The oldest of eight children, Mary made her own dress and wedding

cake when she and Calvin were married at Sycamore Grove in 1966. She became the bookkeeper for the farm, the church, the cemetery and the RR4. "But perhaps her greatest achievement," Gwen said in the eulogy, "was organizing her husband's... well, just organizing her husband."

That included making four pair of crushed velvet overalls that became part of the *RR4* legacy. She took a pair of Calvin's work overalls and cut them apart for a pattern, got the hardware from Big Smith in St. Joseph and went to work. In fact, she did it twice. When Don replaced original tenor **Everett Roth** in 1983, that required a larger pair of overalls. Since the original material was no longer available, Mary went back and produced four brand-new, darker blue pair that proved to be of championship caliber.

When the 2011 Society International unfolds here next year and the *RR4* are honored on the 25th anniversary of their championship year, there will be a display featuring the quartet in the registration area. It will include a pair of those original velour overalls. When you see them, think of the gentle seamstress who won't be there in person to share the moment—but her spirit will linger over the entire week.

Rest in peace, Mary. 🎔

HOA Financial Corner

Why Didn't The Rest Of Us Know?

It's been a while since I have contributed a Financial Corner article for *Harmonotes* (don't know why, I haven't had anything else to do), however, there is one article that should be repeated every year or so. It last appeared in March 2009 under the above title.

The article explained that all expenses a member incurs by going to contests – travel, lodging, meals, etc. – are tax deductible as a charitable expense if you itemize deductions. I mentioned that based upon the results of my very informal poll, perhaps 80 to 90 percent of you were not aware of these deductions.

Recent discussions indicate that new members would like to know about the deductions and that older (longevity) members may need a refresher.



You may deduct the expenses because you are being educated. Section 5.4 of the Chapter Treasurer's Manual says: "... IRS regulations state that an educational organization is one

designed primarily for the "improvement or development of the capabilities of the individual."...The main part of a chapter's activity is directed toward improving and developing the capability of the individual to sing barbershop harmony."

These expenses are deductible because barbershop chapters fall under Section 501C(3) and are only deductible as charitable expenses. They are limited to 30% of the amount on Form 1040, line 38 (adjusted gross income).

You must itemize deductions on Schedule A to use them.

You may deduct expenses associated with public appearances including contest, shows and other public appearances, and attendance at inter-chapter, area and district meetings (but not including chapter meetings unless you are specified officers). You may deduct expenses connected with travel such as travel fares, meals, lodging and expenses incident to travel unless you are only a spectator.

You must have very good records of your expenses in case you are audited. Also the IRS sometimes has trouble locating our organization in the IRS Code. The Chapter Treasurer's Manual gives explicit instructions on how to locate it (it is listed as SPEBSQSA).

I'd fly 43 Hours to Sing a Tag in Philly!

My total travel time from the barracks here in Camp Arifjan, Kuwait, to my hometown of Springfield, Mo., including all layovers was around 43 hours, with the total air time at 19 hours and 45 minutes one way.

My adorable wife **Lisa** and I shared my 15 days of R&R, that is not to include travel time to and from the deployment site. We spent the first week at home, and headed to Philly for the second week. She understands that I am almost as crazy about barbershop as I am about her.

Now, last year she and I got married on June 13, and put off the honeymoon for a couple week so we could go to Anaheim for a week or so. It was there she was introduced to the international contest and convention. "It is amazing," she said in the lobby of the hotel at 2:22 a.m. on Saturday "that so many of us were not only still up, but still singing." She enjoyed it so

much that weekend that she was willing to purchase two tickets to the 2010 International Convention in Philadelphia.. She also mentioned that she wanted to get the (convention) pin for her lanyard.:0)

Well, as deployments go, they are not very easy to predict. So once I received my orders that stated I was going, we were a little unsure if I would be able to get my R&R dates to line up with the convention dates. My original dates for R&R were going to have me return to Kuwait on the 3rd of July. That meant I would need to start traveling from Springfield around

the 2nd of July and that would not allow me to see much of the contest. After negotiating a little with my company commander, he allowed me to shift my travel dates enough to be able to see the entire contest, and return to Springfield safely with a day to spare.

So we headed off to Philly, via Kansas City and Detroit. We stayed the night at a friend's house in KC, Jake and Laura Boswell. Jake and I were deployed together in 2007 to Baghdad, Iraq. They were kind enough to take us to the airport at 5 a.m. to catch our 6

As we walk into the headquartetrs hotel in Philly, we see a few familiar faces including that of Gold Medal Baritone from the RR4, **Jim Bagby**, and he already has a tag picked out to sing. Well, my week was pretty well made after that. But we stuck around for more, just for the fun of it. We met up with some other friends, **Alex** and **Ted Scott.** Ted and I sing in Springfield, and his son Alex and I sang with the American Barberboys in Anaheim at our first international contest. We also sang with the *HOA* chorus from KC. Most Barbershoppers know that it doesn't

matter how long it has been since you last sang with your harmonizing friends, it's almost like yesterday, and the story picks back up where you left off

Well, the contest and convention was breath-taking, with the comedy winning over the crowd and judges. We of course were cheering for our CSD choruses and quartets. I was very proud to cheer them on. Once again I see Jim Bagby, and he says lets sing a tag. He introduced me to so many Gold Medal singers that when we were singing tags I was too busy listening to them to remember to breath or sing. [see picture]. It was awesome. I felt like a green barbershopper again, all nervous and I could not stop laughing because of the way it felt. What a wonderful experience, and to share it with my wife was extra-special.

We also went to the Sunday Sing with the *Good News Quartet*, AKA *Happiness Emporium*. I really enjoy listening to an experienced quartet like them. By the way I am a *Happiness Emporium* beby
