Dennis Kinghorn was known to his friends in the Kansas City

Chapter as "Denny" and, by all accounts, was a pretty mean bass with a good command of music and music theory honed by 25 years as director of his church choir.

Dennis joined the chapter in 1991 from the Overland Park Chapter where he and **Marlin Weidler** sang in a quartet they called *Tons of Fun*. The two visited an *HOA* rehearsal one night and eventually became part of the chapter. In the 1990s he sang in two quartets: *Reverie* with **John Braden**, **Bruce Wenner** and **Marlin Weidler** and in *Good Vibrations* with **Mike Mathieu**, **Rob Mathieu** and **Grant Hunget**. Denny was fairly active in the chorus leadership, adding his musical expertise where he could. He often helped critique bass qualification tapes to help members prepare for shows or at contest and, on occasion, would invite members of the bass section to his home to work on trouble spots he found on their tape.

Dennis died Tuesday, April 17, 2012, at his home in Shawnee, Kansas, ending more than two decades as a Barbershopper and 21 years as a member of *HOA*. He is survived by two sons, two sisters, a brother, **Chris Kinghorn**, who is a past member of *HOA*, and several grandchildren, nieces and nephews. He will be interred in Mountainview Cemetery in Pocatello, Idaho. ♥

Observations of a 53-Year Member of the Kansas City, Mo. Chapter by Dan Henry Bowser



Please allow Ol' Dan an opportunity to vocalize some thoughts that have been gnawing at his aging brain. When you're through reading this, you might disagree with all you read, and

contribute the thoughts herein to senility. I'm OK with that. However, if you should find some things that parallel your ponderings, may this serve to urge you to <u>do something about it</u>. I don't think I'm senile yet, but I am too old for the battle.

It's not just an observation, but a fact that the Society's membership continues to diminish. Every Society president in the 63 years of my membership has forwarded ideas, plans, projects, attitudes, time and talent toward increased membership in our beloved hobby, but the **facts** deny those efforts.

And guys are leaving us **in spite of the fact** that we're creating much, much better music as each year passes. Well, that doesn't seem to make any sense, does it? Bartlesville Barflies music = the Society growing like crazy, Current champs (name any that you like) = Society losing members like crazy. *Whassamatter*?

I think it's simple. We've gotten wealthier on the music, but in the process forgot some basics about the guys creating it. Consider your own thoughts: You joined because singing is pleasurable to you, and barbershop offers that on a ringing platter. Right? So, what's your **goal or aim** at this point? I'd say it's participating in a **hobby** that brings satisfaction in singing with other guys that like to sing. It's fun! Simple enough.

Is your goal to spend a three-hour meeting standing on risers and working like crazy to bring two songs to **absolute perfection** so you can amaze other barbershoppers with your exceptional talent? To a few, that's fine. The problem in KC? The word "few."

Now, before you draw any conclusions as to the intent of this, let me pause long enough to explain something. **NO ONE** enjoys the perfect harmony created by today's quartets and choruses more than I do! **NO ONE** cheers louder for *AOH* or *VM* or *RR4* or *Gas House* or *Old School* or...*you name it*.... than I do. **I am not arguing against musical perfection.** I am arguing against too many chapters trying to achieve it **at the expense of membership loss! And in particular, OUR CHAPTER!**

The thought of HOA, my Kansas City chapter, taking less that 45 guys to International, just sticks in my craw. The thought of only 25 to 35 on the risers on any given rehearsal night, eats at my sensibilities. And especially at a time when the Society is really begging for membership increases. SOMETHING IS WRONG, folks, and it ain't the nice music that's coming from the risers. It's the constant efforts to aim toward contests that's the problem. Preparation for shows is necessary and not to blame. It's the emphasis on competition rather than satisfying a more relaxed HOBBY attitude that diminished OUR CHAPTER from numbers TWICE the size of today's, and in the process we

are <u>denying</u> active membership to guys who LOVE TO SING! That is diametrically opposed to the Society's efforts toward membership increases, growth that most certainly is **crucial to the survival** of the Society.

I salute all efforts toward forwarding our hobby interests, particularly the way HOA has served as "International Flagship" toward interesting teens in our hobby with Harmony Explosion. That is a marvelously wonderful effort that just may prevent the membership slide in years to come, but we desperately need a **huge** change in aims **today**!

Maybe I should have titled this article, "Chorus **contests** are the enemy of membership in the Kansas City, Missouri chapter" Granted, other chapters seem to maintain memberships—even grow—in spite of the grueling efforts demanded by contest preparation. But, it has **NOT** worked that way in Kansas City. We are better sounding, but disappearing. Can **you** do anything to turn us around? May I make some suggestions?

A contest hiatus. its length to be determined by the growth in chapter membership. If it takes several years to build the chapter to a pre-determined size, so be it. Spend the abandoned "contest prep" time concentrating on making the meeting interesting and fun. Among the numerous advantages to this, a **big** money saver to the chapter and its members.

Loose the membership noose of "near perfect singer or nothing."

Make the office of **Program** vice president what it was originally intended to be as outlined in early Society instructions to chapter officers, namely a man who designs the content of each chapter meeting and sees that it is followed. He is not a dictator. He's a designer who works hand-in-hand with the board and other officers including the director.

Inter-chapter relations. Trading visits. It's a great time and a pleasing activity for all, <u>especially</u> to new chapter members. Take the money spent on contests and instead, hire a bus or two and head to another chapter.

Whatever happened to our meetings devoted to quartet contests **within** our own chapter? Unregistered quartets, maybe including other city-wide chapters. Used to be one every spring and fall. No more. Now, much of those times each year is devoted to contest prep.

I think all would agree that more meeting time could certainly be used in preparation for our show. Sure our show includes "contest" songs, but those need not occupy time that robs from others.

Give your program veep a chance to develop his thoughts and talents, with the ultimate aim being membership increase created by fun, interesting meetings, **not** two-and-a- half or three hours on risers devoted entirely to bettering a position in competition.

I thank you for giving it some thought. 🎔





BCQ Earns First Trip to International Competition!

"Ladies and Gentlemen: RRRepresenting the Central States District, from Kansas City and Metro Kansas City chapters, *B...C...Q...!*" (and the crowd goes WILD!)

That's what you'll hear at the beautiful Rose Garden Arena in Portland, OR, this summer at our very first International Convention as a quartet. That's right, *HOA's* newest foursome, *BCQ*, had an auspicious debut at Central States District prelims in Omaha, NE, last weekend, and punched our ticket to the 'big dance' this summer. We posted an average of 76.7. That's 1.7 percentage points over what *BCQ* scored last October at the fall contest, after forming in August 2011. We couldn't be happier or more excited about what lies ahead, for these so-called barber-brats.

Not only did *BCQ* qualify for International over the weekend, we brought home two more district awards. In the "You Be the Judge" Audience Favorite Contest, *BCQ* won top honors for the award, 'The Tag That Gave You Goosebumps" for "Smile Medley" in a field of 21 quartet competitors from three districts. And **Rob Mathieu** was the audience choice for 'Favorite Tenor.' [Ed. Note: Rob has won the award twice previously].

On top of all that excitement, my wife, **Haley**, who is 39 weeks along, gives me the 'go' to Omaha, to compete with the quartet. Haley and the kids stayed home. Being 'on call' all weekend, was both stressful and exciting. After the call-off of qualifiers, CSD C&J Vice President **Jim Bagby** allowed *BCQ* to move to the top of the showcase, then he and emcee **Don Fuson** sent me packing. **Matt Moore** and **Tom Wenner** both stayed over in Omaha, for evaluations (and tags), and **Brian Marston** rode home with me. The excitement level was too high for either of us to consider sleeping on the way home.

Tom even taped the evals from the judges, and sent them to **Brian** and me by email. As I type this on Wednesday, 4-25, Haley and baby are at work, and scheduled to arrive no later than May 1, and no earlier than right now. ;)

The risk the family and I took was well worth the reward of qualifying and representing *HOA, Central Standard* (Tom is a dual member) and the CSD in Portland this summer at International.

BCQ might not have had the highest qualifying score among all quartets last weekend, but from the reactions, the feedback and the love we felt the entire weekend, we certainly won the hearts of the crowd and the district.

Sarah Jane, Tone-Henge, Ol' Dan Out to Pasture

"She's (no longer) my freckle-faced, consumptive, Sarah Jane!" And that ends a relationship that goes back to the 1960s, with a quartet that hoboed out of the Kansas City Chapter and became one of the most popular in the Society. In fact, it was to keep alive some of the *Merry Mugs*' routines that led to the formation of *Tone-Henge*, which announced its retirement after 14 years this month.

But for the benefit of the younger and newer members of the *Heart of America* family, let me backtrack a little. The original *Merry Mugs* were **Dennis Taylor, Frank Leone, Dan Henry Bowser** and **Bob Gall**, all chapter leaders – in fact, Bob went on to become Society president in 1969. When Dennis' duties become too demanding as senior pilot for TWA, **Ed Rooker** replaced him on tenor.

The Mugs were active about 10 years, into the mid-1970s, including being one of the first Society quartets chosen to represent SPEBSQSA, Inc., entertaining our wounded troops during the Vietnam war. They made a trip sponsored by the Navy Exchange to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, in 1965. They were accompanied by Society Executive Director **Hugh Ingraham** and two other quartets. In 1967, the *Mugs* logged 19,000 miles in 19 days on a USO tour to hospitals in Hawaii, Guam, Philippines, Okinawa and Japan. The quartet came out of retirement for shows into the 1980s before they said "enough is enough." But their bum routine was classic, and always included – show and afterglow – "Sarah Jane." On the glow, Dan would have different jokes and cackle after the first one, "Thought you were gonna hear the same rotten gags!" Bob often had the list hidden in his slouch bum hat and would offer suggestions under his breath.

Other Mug favorites included "Curse of an Aching Heart," "With Her Head Tucked Underneath Her Arm," "Put a Nickel on the Drum" and "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles," in which they shot long balloons into the afterglow audience.

So in the early '90s, Dan (mostly) came up with the idea of a quartet to resurrect some of the *Mug* routines. The result was *Hubbub*, with Bob again on bass, sweet-singing **Manley Vance** on lead and me on tenor (I said I'd be willing to do anything to sing with Dan, and that sure proves it). We even went so far as to talk Bob's wife, coach extraordinaire **Harriett**, into lead-ing us through a couple of competitions. We don't know who regretted that more: Harriett, the quartet or the CSD audiences.

Dan even made a frog suit for *Hubbub*, almost suffocated in it on stage, redid it and then shipped it off to the first person who expressed an interest. He and **Estyl** also made knight outfits, com-

plete with shields that turned into a *Hubbub* crest on the tag of "Never Kiss a Maiden with Your Visor Down" (of course, a Bowser original). We scored almost in the 50s! Then Bob died and was replaced by **Willard Yoder**, who starred in "I'm Going Back to Where I Come From." That's also when the "Culture Song" was born. But Willard was busy with *Rural Route 4* and his job; commuting and other factors came into play, and Hubbub soon was no more.

Not long afterward, **Keith Schweer** resigned from his district championship gig with *12th Street Rag. RR4* had retired in 1994 and one night the last three guys at the bar other than **Bruce Wenner** (who pretty much owns a patent on the concept) were Dan, Keith and me. It would be nice to say "thus was born *Tone-Henge*," but it wasn't that easy, because we are basically four baritones. Yes, Keith is a champeen bass, but not a low one, and as he has demonstrated lately with his switch in *HOA*, he has a knack for bari. So first came the discussion of who would sing what?

I was adamant about not being stuck on tenor again. I had the idea that Dan, despite his 50 years of singing thin, bright bari could be an **Earl Moon**-type ringy lead (we'll all pause to enjoy a good laugh here) and Bruce good-naturedly said something that sounded like he'd be willing to do anything to sing with Dan...

In the midst of these discussions over a couple of weeks, BEFORE WE'D HAD ONE REHEARSAL, Dan came up with the quartet name and registered it. End of that discussion. And a pretty good idea.

Once more we pressured, er, got Harriett involved and did manage to win the CSD spring senior quartet championship. But comedy always has been our forte, and we've been fortunate enough to do shows across the CSD, and even a couple out of district. That has allowed us to take our lovely ladies – **Estyl, Francie, Connie and Joann** – for some delightful dinner outings that we'll remember long after the chords have faded.

An even bigger honor for us is what Chapter President **Vince Perry** and *HOA* came up with following the April 14 show, making *Tone-Henge*, collectively, winner of the 2011 Ozzie. What a surprise, and what a thoughtful touch!

Harriett is gone, as are Dennis, Frank, Bob, Ed and Manley. Dan says that at age 87 he has done enough Singing Valentines (he actually said that several years inna row) and maybe even his share of bell ringing – we'll see. The eight of us do intend to keep socializing, and the four of us will keep singing tags, which is what brought us together in the first place. And many nights we'll still be four of the last guys at the bar.



Okay, let's clear this up right now. It isn't quite the same as **R2-D2** in Star Wars, but technology is certainly catching up at **Children's Mercy Hospita**I. R2-D2 at CMH equates to the MAI-536 Maico MA40, which is a portable air and bone audiometer. It includes a headset, bone oscillator and instruction manual, which is almost unheard of today – the manual I mean.

This unit will be used in a sound booth for young children who cannot raise their hand in response to the sound. The audiologist will sit with the child and use this portable audiometer to present tones, at the

same time having the child drop a block every time the sound is heard. This is called "play conditioning" and allows the audiologist to obtain more information and more accurate results with young children. Without this portable device, the audiologist must sit isolated from the child behind a window to run the audiometer, which may result in less complete and less accurate testing. The unit costs \$1,925.

On April 24t, I had the very distinct pleasure of feeling as much like a "Royal" as I probably ever will. I met with **Dr. Cynthia Jacobsen**, Director, Hearing and Speech Clinic; **Lauren Davis**, Manager of Major Gifts, and **Shanelle Varone**, Managing Director

of Major Gifts in the lobby of Children's Mercy Hospital. I was there to present our Singing Valentine donation of \$1,330. This was after passing through a security check-point that is almost the equivalent of any airport you may encounter – a good thing.

I was given the grand tour that included a newer sound booth than last seen. This one lets the kids feed cookies to the cookie monster when hearing a sound, but also with so many more variations according to age and ability, which reaches to the age of 21. Many of the varying types of testing centers were so busy that I wasn't able to view them, but Cynthia explained all to me.

After my presentation to them on behalf of *HOA*, we spent about an hour talking about not only their 116th Jubilee soon approaching, but our own **Barbershop Harmony Society** history and 75th anniversary as well. Somehow, with our long celebrated ties, it all seemed to feel very natural and like visiting with family.

Our relationship with CMH really began in 1991, when **Larry Poisner** asked Cynthia, "What can HOA do for you?" We started the idea with concerts at the Northland Cathedral for two years, and in third year decided to then donate a portion of the Singing Valentines proceeds to CMH. The rest, as they say, is history!

Now, I had a surprise up my sleeve that Cynthia, Lauren or Shanelle had not an inkling of! Thanks to our own **Carter Combs**, who with others had been researching early chapter history, I had a bombshell to drop on them. Although it wasn't Singing Valentines related, it certainly was Kansas City Heart of America Chorus related, and CMH related!

The following is an article from the very first SPEBSQSA newsletter, called the "Barber Shop Re-Chordings" (precursor to our Harmonizer) published in November 1941. The editor was none other than our very own Joe Stern!

"Sweet Adeline" and old-fashioned "meller-drammer" in two acts, and an epilogue was staged by the Kansas City Chapter, recently. This boisterous comedy of the old west during the gay nineties was a

> big hit. The show also included singing by members of the K.C. chapter, the Pole-Cats Quartet, and a line of beautiful dancing girls. In addition, there was a variety show of good vaudeville.

The entire net proceeds, amounting to \$1,007, was donated to the Children's Mercy Hospital, and institution devoted exclusively to children, and supported entirely by charitable contributions.

The story and dialogue was written by Cecil F. Holman, a radio writer, and a member of the Kansas City Chapter, officially known as "Vice President in Charge of **Holding the High Note** at the End of Sweet Adeline."

Who knew that Children's Mercy was

one of our very first charities of choice, over seven decades ago? And my surprise blew them away! Although our current donation to CMH is 25 percent of net proceeds, I couldn't help but do the history and inflation thing on the numbers. Remember that we as a nation in 1941 were struggling to evolve from a depression, yet to join WWII. It was a different world as far as entertainment and commitment to organizations.

To put inflation into perspective, in 1941, \$1.00 would be worth \$15.60 today. That means that the \$1,007 donated to CMH in 1941 would equal \$15,714.13 today. To reverse the equation, our \$1,330 today would be worth \$85.23 in 1941. I know this seems to be a downer and is hard to get your head around, but remember its all inflation-related, and nothing to be ashamed of. I only wish we could donate 100 percent as in the past -- and perhaps in the future that could be a possibility.

I relish the opportunity to be a part of CMH's history (they started in 1897), and to be a representative of HOA in that event. They in turn plan to include us as a vital part of their sustaining growth into their future as well, including our 1941 accomplishment.

In last month's edition I told you that the *HOA* Board would be considering the future of the *Harmonotes* as a monthly bulletin and gave you an opportunity to complete a short survey expressing your opinions. Four people completed the survey and all four selected different options which didn't provide much input. Still I would like to thank them, especially for their additional comments.

At the April 10, 2012 Board meeting the board discussed the pros and cons of keeping it monthly, going bi-monthly, going quarterly, going semi-annually, going annually, or eliminating the publication all together. I really thought the board would change to bi-monthly and was a little surprised when they voted unanimously to change the publication from monthly to quarterly. Leading factors in the decision were lack of input from members, a cost savings, and a slight change in focus so that the new quarterly edition will be more closely identified as a public awareness publication while recording the history of the chapter with traditional articles.

After consulting with our editor Todd Anderson it was decided that the four editions would be seasonal. The Spring Edition should be published around May 1 and will include news about Singing Valentines, Harmony Explosion, the Annual Show, and the CSD Spring Convention and Contests. The Summer Edition will be published around August 1 and will include news about international and other late spring, early summer HOA events. The Fall Issue is to be published around November 1 and will focus on Music In The Park and the fall CSD Contests and Convention. Finally the Winter Edition published around February 1 will cover the Holiday Show, the Salvation Army Bell Ringing Caravan, and the Installation/Awards Banquet. All editions will record the chapter's history and provide a vision for the future while at the same time explaining to the public our mission of what our chorus, guartets, and auxiliaries are all about. We envision lead articles that promote barbershopping in a positive way through stories about HOA that hopefully the general public will find interesting and somewhat educational with respect to four-part a cappella harmony in the Kansas City area.

I don't know how many years the *Harmonotes* has been published monthly but it's been around for decades! Our newly formed history committee will probably have more information on this topic in upcoming editions. Until then let me thank all the editors, writers, photographers, proofers, printers, collators and mailers, who have through the years made the *Harmonotes* one of the Society's most respected chapter publications.

As for the future, only time will tell if the new *Harmonotes* will be successful in serving the needs of our chapter and community. One thing is certain; it will take the combined effort of many people to make it happen. So, chapter officers, PR people, membership committee members, musical leaders, committee chairs, quartets, *Heartbeats*, *New Harmony Handful*, and all active and inactive Heart of America members, pick up your palettes and brushes and let's all get to painting the new *HOA Harmonotes*, one season at a time! We can do this!
