Again, the *HOA* troops stepped up to answer the call. Once things were set into motion, it was almost like driving that Porsche I've heard so much about lately.

For me, beyond benefits that the **Hearing and Speech Clinic of Children's Mercy Hospitals and Clinics** receive, a major reward is the stories that the quartets come back

with. The following is one **Barry Sanders** shared with me:

"We knew ahead of time that the daughter of this elderly couple had paid for 1 extra song for this gig. However since our regular lead, **Jon Gathright**, was not with us Mike Schumacher was subbing for Jon. Mike is a pretty good lead but he didn't really know any of the songs we sing in our regular repertoire, so we had to quickly get up to speed on an extra song that all four of us could sing. We chose "I love you truly" since it is short and relatively easy.

We were asked to call ahead for this gig since we were to sing for an older couple who both live in the same facility, but one is in assisted living and the other lives in the nursing home section. When we got close and called the daughter, she contacted the retirement home to get the couple together so we could sing to both of them. When we arrived in the correct room we were greeted by a nice looking couple, with the man being in a wheel chair so we assumed that he was the one whose health was failing. This proved to be correct.

We proceeded to start our regular routine, and immediately noticed that there was a lot of loving eye contact between the two of them, indicating a lot of lasting and endearing love and possibly the

Toward the end of our second song, "Heart of My Heart," the lady leaned over and grabbed her husband's hand and held it tightly, as she was obviously being moved by what we were singing to them. Lyle Rolofson and I nearly got caught up in the emotion and had to really focus to keep from blowing the song.

At the end of the third song, the wife stopped us and told us that they had been married for 65 years, and then quickly piped up that they had dated for 8 years before that, so this couple was obviously in their late 80's, or even older. We started our fourth and last song, "I Love You Truly," and didn't think too much about it other than the fact that we didn't want to blow our extra song, which none of us knew as well as our other three songs. We made it through the song just fine, and we were feeling guite proved of

ourselves when the lady stopped us and said: "Did you know, they sang that song at our wedding - 65 years ago?" We were just "blown away", and we

decided that it was a "God" thing. This was our favorite Valentine."

Our new format from last year continues to emphasized participation and fun more than competition. Three divisions – 8th Grade and Under; 10th Grade and Under; 12th Grade and Under – encourage more participation at younger age levels. Quartets in the 8th Grade and Under division are also allowed to compete with 4 or 5 or 6 or 7 or 8 members, to give them an extra boost of confidence by singing in larger groups. These young students also do not have to compete with Freshmen! Likewise, Freshmen and Sophomores do not compete with Juniors or Seniors!

Once again we provided plenty of examples of a cappella barbershop singing for the students, the parents, and the music educators all day long. *The Kansas City Chorus of Sweet Adelines* started the day at 9am by singing two songs to delight the audience. Next Legacy stepped onto the stage and performed a mini-concert to get everyone fired up for the day's activities. **Lori Carrender** and **Jerry Garrard** lead 30-minute warm-up sessions for the respective girls and boys groups prior to the preliminary contest rounds. Thirty-nine quartets performed in the prelims and twenty qualified for the finals. *The Heart of America Chorus* sang for the audience prior to the announcement of the finalists. *The Cody Choraliers* serenaded the participants during lunch, which was catered by the Olive Garden of Olathe.

BoomTown helped to teach Barbershop Tags to the boys while *Legacy* was teaching a few tags to the girls after lunch, prior to the finals. After the finals were done, all of the girls gathered on stage to sing their tags, and the boys did the same (with assistance from *BoomTown*). The Gold and Silver medals were handed out and the event was concluded before 5pm. Mission Accomplished!



AL HIGGINS · 1933 ~ 2014

Albert J. Higgins (we knew him simply as AI), and long time friend, Chuck Ames, moved from Havs. Kansas to Emporia. In about 1992, they transferred their membership from Emporia to Kansas City and from that time on both were important fixtures in chapter activities. Al arranged travel and hotel accommodations for chorus members going to District and International competitions for several years, arranged accommodations for HOA retreats in Atchison. Kan-

sas, and helped select performance uniforms and tuxedos for the chapter. On at least one occasion he was instrumental in crafting vests for *HOA*. Al was a tireless promoter of the annual spring show and was often ticket chairman.

Al operated almost exclusively in the background. Many never knew that he took charge of critical tasks nor were they aware of who did them. In mid January, for a number of years, he began the task of securing roses, candy and greeting cards in preparation for the annual *HOA* Singing Valentine Program then managed the Valentine operations for at least three days around each Feb. 14.

Al was a strong believer in education, having been a speech/ debate/drama teacher in the years before he came to Kansas City. He worked with area schools in Emporia and Kansas City to promote better singing for children and, along with Monty Duerksen, whom he sand with in Emporia, worked to develop and grow the Young Men in Harmony program in Emporia and the Harmony Explosion program in Kansas City. Monty had started the Young Men in Harmony at Emporia and Al became interested so it was natural that they both work to develop the program. For a number of years Al served as the moderator of the program and then trained his successors. The program became known simply as HE! (Harmony Explosion!) to the kids. To this day the boys and girls quartet winners from both the junior and senior high divisions are guest performers on HOA's Annual Spring Show. He was in his element when he introduced the guartets at the spring show sharing his knowledge of the Harmony Explosion program with the audience.

Al organized and chaired numerous *HOA* Installation and Awards banquets over the years. Though the title Chorus Manager was never officially bestowed on him, he was just that: a guy that made things happen for the chorus.

Over the years, AI received at least 12 *HOA* Barbershopper of the Month and Extra Mile Awards and was selected as Kansas City Chapter Barbershopper of the Year in 2003.

In 2002, he was chosen as Central States District Barbershopper of the Year for the work he did with the District including managing the District President's hospitality room extravaganza.

People who knew Al well can attest to his exceptional culinary skills, a master chef who loved to bake. On occasion, he would prepare a top-notch birthday feast for a few of his close friends or bring a cake or cookies to a chapter meeting.



In recent years, Al's health began to decline and he dropped his chapter membership but his love for barbershop music and the Kansas City Chapter never wavered. Even when he was placed in hospice care, he continued to listen to the music he loved so well. In late January, 2014, he was thrilled when the *New Harmony Handful* paid him a musical visit (shown above), shared a few laughs and invited him to join in a couple of songs. Al was an accomplished baritone with a great face.

There is little doubt that AI had a rewarding life. He was an influential voice in making the Kansas City Chapter what it is today. The newer members of *HOA* did not know AI Higgins but they are reaping the benefits of his accomplishments.

Al Higgins died, April 6, 2014, at age 80 due to complications from leukemia, heart problems and pneumonia. He requested no funeral.
