

DAN HENRY BOWSER 1925 ~ 2015

Ol' Dan "Fair Weather" Henry Bowser spent 68 of his 89 years as the proudest member of the Barbershop Harmony Society, first in Topeka, and since 1954, in the Kansas City Chapter.

Over the years he was *HOA* chorus director, chapter president, emcee and much more. As **Jim Bagby** said in the tribute to Dan at the spring show in April, "Nobody didn't love Dan Henry."

Dan was the man out front at the Salvation Army outings every year for nearly as long as anyone can remember, and long ago earned the Army's "Bellringer of the Year" Award. Whether *HOA* performed at area shopping malls or at Caroling Caravan performances, he took his turn at directing "Jingle Bells" employing his patented right-shoulder shrug at one phrase and following it up with a left-shoulder shrug at another. During performances at area malls, Dan circulated through the crowd with his "Army" basket collecting money and greeting shoppers.

He was *HOA* barbershopper of the year in 1966, Central States District Hall of Fame member and in 2007 became the second person to be named recipient of the Kansas City Chapter's highest honor, the Joe Stern Award for Lifetime Achievement. *(Continued on page 2* \Rightarrow)

As for Dan, he loved singing – with his brothers, with **Estyl** and their children and with other couples. He was the front man for the globe-trotting *Merry Mugs*, for *Hubbub* and for *Tone-Henge* – all entertaining comedy quartets. His foursomes were generally known as "Dan and the hummers." He made "OI' Sarah Jane" a household name Society-wide and resurrected a portion of the routine during *Tone-Henge's* swan song performance on the 2012 *HOA* spring show. The *Merry Mugs* were one of the first quartets chosen to represent the *BHS* on two U.S.O. tours to the Philippines, Guam and the Far East during the Vietnam War era. Dan was the last surviving member of the *Mugs*.

At the Society level, he had just last year been honored with the Dave LaBar Award, putting him in the barbershopping hall of fame for master of ceremonies. Going back to the 1970s, he probably served as emcee for more chapter shows, district contests and international conventions than any other member in Society history.

Dan Henry, as most everyone knew him, was born and raised in Coffeyville, Kansas, spent time in the U.S. Navy during WWII, received his bachelor's degree from Kansas State University and a master's degree in education from Kansas University. He held numerous jobs over the years including junior high school general science teacher and as announcer for Topeka radio station WIBW. He joined WDAF-AM radio in 1959 as a disk jockey and moved to weekend weatherman at WDAF-TV in 1970 then to full time weatherman. He retired in 1992 after 20 years.

Dan Henry died Feb. 28, 2015 at age 89 after a long struggle with emphysema. He is survived by his wife of 69 years, **Estyl**, sons **Brian** and **Bradley**, former member of HOA, and daughter **Kathryn**, two grandsons and two granddaughters.

About 70 past and present members of *HOA* were part of the nearly full sanctuary of the Old Mission United Methodist Church in Fairway, Kansas, to pay their respects at the memorial service for Dan. *HOA* chorus members sang *I Believe* and *Friends*.

Over the years, I have sung in a number of SV quartets mostly built around the *Crosstown Four*. Most times, it was the *CT4* but, at others, one or more of us was not available and so we used able fill-ins for whomever was not there.

I still recall the time when one of the fill-ins who had the task of presenting the card to the recipient took a bathroom break before we went into the office where we were to sing. As he came out he was very red in the face and asked if we had any more cards in the car. It seems that the one he had been carrying accidently became waterlogged. We did have more and after we had prepared it with the requested message, we went in and sang a few minutes later than planned. We all had hard time making it past the point where he handed the new dry card to the young woman without laughing.

I recall another time when I had to teach on the days we were doing SV but there were no extra tenors to fill in. So we worked it out that we'd get a fill-in bari for the times I was not available and **Ron Abel** would do the tenor and then, when I could sing, they'd swing by pick me up and we go on dropping the bari back at headquarters as a fill-in for another quartet. This meant however that I had to meet my classes in my red vest and bow tie since we had little time in between for me to change given the numbers we had to deliver. That took some explaining as well as my polite refusal to sing a solo for the classes. I think the most we did in one day back then may have been 28 as the day went from 8 to 8. And we did not have GPS to find where to go!

This year I became a "fill-in" for Larry Colburn and sang with Jon Gathright, Rich Huyck and Barry Sanders in their guartet. We had a busy enough schedule that took us all over the metro from homes to offices to restaurants both days. But the most memorable was when we thought we'd become the Pied Piper quartet. This happened when we went to an office building to find our recipient only to discover that his office was on a different floor than we had entered. When one of the staff began to take us to the correct floor, all of the staff on the floor we had entered followed and were joined by curious others on the floor we went to until, by the time we go to the correct work station, I estimate more than 100 were standing with us — but the work station was empty. So we waited until the intended arrived and of course he was totally at a loss to see all the others standing nearby. And to make it even more curious, it appears that the SV was from a former employer telling him how much he was already missed! It all reminded me of the fun and surprises that I shared with the CT 4 so many times and I want to thank Rich. Jon and Barry for letting me again experience the thrill. •

Having decided recently to renew its registration as a quartet in the BHS and celebrate what will be its 30th year as such, a practice was held at the home of **Ron Abel** on May 28, 2015. Ron dutifully listed all of the songs we last rehearsed in September of 2013 and indicated which keys we had chosen for their pitch. His report was accepted by the others (**Val Putzier, Gordy Coleman** and me) without much discussion.

Such a remarkable discovery was so exhilarating we decided to sing Irish Blessing and adjourn to the plate of chocolate brownies that was waiting for us in the kitchen. We do plan to get back to at least a semiannual rehearsal schedule with a few extra sprinkled in as well since **Anne's** brownies are so very good. **•**

At this writing, score sheets are available for all districts and affiliates except for Sweden (SNOBS). Rocky Mountain District and Southwestern District qualified their quartets in October 2014 [both now have only one convention per year – ed.].



Some of our affiliates also qualify their quartets in the previous year. SNOBS held its 2015 convention in April.

In 2014, 53 quartets competed in Las Vegas. Just over half (31) quartets will return to Pittsburgh this July to compete at International. Three others qualified this spring but did not choose to compete.

This year, there are 54 quartets competing at International. Besides the 31 from last year, there are 2 that competed in 2013 and laid out in 2014, plus 9 at their first International, 6 which scratched in 2014 but are competing this year, and another 6 that failed to qualify in 2014 but qualified in 2015. Each of the top 5 seeded quartets improved their qualifying score from 2014 by 2% or more. In the second 10, the quartet to watch is *Stockholm Syndrome* from Sweden; their 2015 qualifying score showed an improvement of 7.67%, the largest jump for any quartet competing this year.

The top quartet among the first-time competitors is Quorum from JAD, seeded 9th in the lineup. Of local interest, Harmonium posted a score similar to that of High Definition, and is seeded 13th. In the group seeded 16th to 20th, watch for *The Con Men* and *Test Drive*. Both improved their 2014 qualifying scores by over 3%. In the next group of 10, up-and-comers are *4.0* and *Late Shift*, both improved more than 4%. Near the bottom, note *Timepiece*, which qualified for International for the first time from Northeastern District. They were a college quartet last year. This year their score was over 5% higher than last year. They may soon be challenging Men in Black (non-competitors this year).

Looking at the districts, the strength of the competition is complicated by the fact that some districts have many quartets competing, while smaller districts have only a handful of quartets trying for international each year.

The progress in SNOBS is especially noteworthy. In 2011, the average for their best 5 quartets was just over 70%, but in 2012, that average leaped to 78.7%.

It has continued to increase and was 82.4% at their recent competition, better than any other Society group. The average for the top five quartets was considered the best measure of the strength of the quartet competition in the districts.

Using that measure, Cardinal district stands out this year (82.2%), followed by Far Western District (81.9%), Sunshine (80.9%) and Johnny Appleseed (80.6%). Central States District is in the middle of the pack this year (12th of 21 districts and affiliates, 75.5%). The overall average of all is 76.3%.

All in all, it should be a great competition in Pittsburgh, and the Swedes may rule again! 🎔
