HOA Director David Krause Steps Down

It was a somber group of *HOAers* the night of July 24 when Director **David Krause** told everyone that he was resigning. David said that his "recipe" for *HOA* just wasn't as effective as he had hoped it would be. His resignation might better be termed "stepping aside" so that the chapter could explore other options to help facilitate it's motto of "Drawn by Harmony, Bound by Friendship, Striving for Excellence." This was not an easy decision for David as I know he was wrestling with the decision even before Portland. Within a few days after Portland he made his decision. As chapter president I want to thank David for quickly bringing me



into his confidence about his impeding resignation on July 24. I also am grateful that he offered to stay on as long as needed until we were able to secure his replacement. *HOA* did take him up on this asking him to direct the upcoming Music In The Park (MITP) concert. He did this in grand style by directing the chorus in 12 songs despite the dangerous heat in the gazebo. Before the last song it was my pleasure to publicly thank David for his 4-1/2 year tenure with *HOA* (see photo above). On behalf of a grateful chapter I presented David a plaque that read:

"Presented to **David Krause**, Director, in grateful appreciation for outstanding musical leadership and dedicated service to the Kansas City, Missouri Chapter of the Barbershop Harmony Society, Inc. from January 2008 to July 2012."You taught us to sing in tune, and that was huge! Many thanks!" Presented by the HOA Chapter, **Vince**Perry, President, July 29, 2012" I had planned for the chorus to sing "Friends" after the awarding of the plaque. 



My Journey To Portland by Michael Hillenburg



My journey to Portland started off like most International Contest and Conventions

where my wife and I purchased tickets at the previous Convention. This year was no exception, but changed a bit along the way. Most of you know that I am in the Missouri Army National Guard, and that I have been deployed to the Middle East twice. What you may not know is that on my second tour I injured my back. After a long year of physical therapy and nearly two years of pain medications, my outlook was pretty good. As long as I didn't "overdo" my work, or lift anything wrong or too heavy then I should recover with time.

When I came up to visit with HOA to let you all know that I would be cheering you all on from my seat. I was offered a chance of a lifetime. Mark had asked me if I would be able to join the chorus on stage. At first I though it was very nice of him to ask, but I told him that I wouldn't be able to, and I know how hard it is to perform at the International Contest level. It just didn't seem like it would be possible. The next day I mentioned to my wife that it made me feel good that I had received the invite. Her reply was, something to the effect of do you feel well enough singing with them, or can you physically, or do you think they will sing better with or without you? The truth of the matter is that I had already said no thank you in my own mind. Lisa mentioned that I should try, school will end in May and that I should have all of June available, and since I have the learning tracks available from the HOA website, learning the choreography shouldn't be that difficult.

I mentioned to a couple of guys in the *Sho-Me Statesmen* chorus that I was planning on going to KC to sing with **HOA** on Tuesday evenings, and then coming home after, and **Ted Kelley** had the same school schedule that I had and he was excited to visit and sing as well. As most of you know High

School students that don't have jobs, don't have a lot of expendable cash. Ted knew early on that he would not be able to go and compete, but like most of us he is in the pursuit of getting better. I see a district champ in his future. School ended, so Ted and I were on track to go up to KC every Tuesday until contest, and to my surprise we made every rehearsal but one. Mr. Vince asked if I was planning on competing with the chorus the second consecutive rehearsal we made. At this time I was not sure if I would be able to make it, so I didn't commit to competing, but I mentioned that I was working on it, and that it was now a possibility. We worked on the words and notes, but the artistry is something that has to develop on the risers.

June was in full swing and it was time to either make the commitment, or move to make room for the competing chorus member. I think it was mid June when I asked Mark if the offer to compete was still open. He said, yes and that he was glad to have me in the lead section. June went well, and the trip to Portland had come. Lisa and I celebrate our honeymoon the same time frame of the convention, so we went up a couple days early, and had planned to stay a couple days after for sight seeing. Although I was in some pain I was able to make all but one of the practices in Portland. and had an amazing experience on stage with 40 of my dearest friends. The songs seem to end quickly, and the curtain was pulled shut. We sang very well, and it was all worth it to me. When I got back to my seat the couples that were sitting around us told me that we sang wonderfully and they seemed genuinely happy about our performance.

The contest scores are posted, and the quartets are down to the top 10, and what a top 10 they are.

Here's the part that not too many may know. Lisa and I were within three hours of going to the airport to head home, and we went to the International Rose Garden



to look around for a couple hours. We didn't see but a fraction of the garden. I had just called my parents to tell them that we are having a great time, and that we should be on the plane in about five hours. We walked around the first section of roses and I sneeze. I felt something in my back move, so I tried to stretch it out on a hand rail that was close. It didn't work so I made my way over to a bench. After sitting for a while I tried to stand, and couldn't. So I laid down on the bench for five to ten minutes, sat back up and tried to stand again. No luck. Lisa went to ask a lady if we could use her walker, but had a language barrier until her daughter came over to help. Eventually she came back with a walker and I was still unable to support myself. At this time I had her call 911. Sitting was no longer an option, and I couldn't make it back to the car on my own. We went to the local ER and they helped me with the pain, but said that I would have to follow up with my doctor when we got home. We ended up changing our flight to the next day, and we went to a hotel closer to the airport to let me rest. She did an amazing job with the luggage and the rental car and getting me home. They gave me a walker and lots of pain meds to take for the next week, but I ran out before seeing my doctor, so once again Lisa took me to the ER in Springfield. More pain medication, and no real answers to what is going on in my back. After seeing my doctor, he asks me why they didn't do any imaging, and sets the appointment for an MRI for the 30th of July.

To some individuals barbershop may just be a hobby, but to others it is medication to the soul. Thank you all for allowing me to sing with you in Portland, and I hope to make it back up to KC soon.



Ordinarily I start out this article by writing "The calendar will soon turn over to the month of December—and remind us of how little time we

have before the holidays will be here." As hot as it has been, I wish I were writing about the approach of winter. But this year, we cannot wait until December to replenish the Presidents' Fund.

The trip to Portland has cut into the fund significantly and, with District just around the corner, the need will be on us again to help those men who require some financial aid to travel with the chorus. And, while no official action has been taken regarding International in 2013 that I am aware of, whether we plan go or not if invited, we need to re-build the fund for needs related to chorus development such as the Retreat.

All of this is my way of once again asking those of our members who may have been waiting to make year-end charitable giving plans to include HOA among them but do not wait until December. **Do it now!** The Kansas City Chapter is a 501 (c) 3 organization under the IRS regulations and donations are tax deductible. Currently, as I pointed out in earlier Harmonotes articles, the Chapter has several ways to make such cash donations: one can just make an "unrestricted" donation to the Chapter to be spent in ways determined by the Board or one can give to the Presidents' Helpers Fund. The President's Fund aids members in times of need to go to contest, retreat and in other ways to participate in the music educational aspect of our hobby. The President's Fund is administered by the Chapter under guidelines provided by the Board. And your contribution will be receipted by the Treasurer for your tax purposes.

Again, remember that old adage 'charity begins at home' and think about HOA as well as the other worthy recipients you support all year long!

Every once in awhile an email is written that is so profound that I feel compelled to share it with a wider audience via the Harmonotes. The following is one such piece written by Mark Fortino, the morning after our Portland Send-off Concert at St Thomas Aquanis. - Vince Perry, Chapter President



Last night was so much FUN! That experience is why I love barbershop. No judge, no contest score can take away the feeling I experienced last night standing on the risers with you guys and singing at that level.

I tell my quartet the same thing every rehearsal that we sing at a very high level. No matter what happens in those six short minutes in front of 15 judges, nobody...nothing can take away what we have already accomplished.

This will be my 18th time on the International stage with a guartet and I have no idea how many with the chorus except to say I think I've been on the International Stage with HOA every year HOA has gone to Internationals since 1988.

Over all of those years, contests have brought me great joy and great sadness. For many years some of my highest highs and lowest lows in barbershop centered around "THE CONTEST".

That all changed for me in 2007 when 12th Street Rag broke up after going into Internationals setting in 5th place and then didn't break the Top 10. It wasn't the sole reason for the break up, 10 years of travel between three cities really wore on the quartet, and it was probably time for a change. To this day we all remain the best of friends. But the drive for competition, scores, placement, while it helped us achieved higher and higher levels, was not the most healthy way to live a fun filled barbershop life! Striving for excellence for the sake of excellence is a much healthier and fun way to enjoy this hobby.

Since that time, I have learned to RELISH in the GOLD MEDAL moments by both my quartets and my chorus. Every rehearsal, the opportunity to experience those special moments is now why I come to rehearsal every week. The rehearsals are what we get to do the most! THAT is where we have to find the highs and the lows. I let the contests be icing on the cake, IF that's the way they turn out.

Voices Unlimited is singing better than it ever has. *HOA* is singing better than it ever has. If that doesn't come out on the stage in those few moments in front of those 15 judges, well, that's life. But NOTHING can take away from what I have been experiencing on a weekly basis this past year. The success of the spring show etc., etc.

I am singing with some special people and I can't wait to have the time of my life and share all of this talent with the Barbershop Kingdom! Lookout Portland, HOA is coming to town with a bit of a chip on our shoulder. We already know how good we are, and we plan to share it with all of you!

My very best wishes to all of you that this convention be a moment to remember...forever!

Donald W. Peck (1925-2012)

Don Peck was a quiet man and a faithful barbershopper through and through. He joined the Overland Park Chapter in 1988 but transferred his membership to the Kansas City Chapter in 1994 so he could sing more and compete in both district and International contests. He loved the music and sang lead with HOA Chorus.

He was an Eagle Scout in his youth, and attended Keystone Junior College in La Plume, Pa. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II as a machinist's mate on a PT Rescue Craft and graduated from Penn State University with a ceramic engineering degree. He was active in his church and in the 1960s he formed and ran a financial planning and advisory business until he retired in 1990.

Don never missed playing golf in the *HOA* golf tournaments but in the last few years his health made it preferable to observe while his wife, **Donie** and their son **David**, played the game — but he was still there. Being a "snow bird," Don and his wife would disappear in the winter months to Florida and return in the spring in time for the annual show.

Donald W. Peck died at his home, July 21, 2012, at the age of 87 after a long illness. He will be missed by the Barbershop Society, the Kansas City Chapter and his many friends at HOA and the Overland Park Chapter.

Thirty-five fellow barbershoppers and former members of HOA sang Friends and I Believe at the memorial service held at the Village Church (Presbyterian) sanctuary, July 25, in Prairie Village, Kan. 🎔

Of course we thought she was going to ask a question about our group, great singing, repertoire, future performances or some such thing, so we were all ears. Then she said, "Whatever happened to Dan Henry?" I'll let you wonder about the answer to that!

Our next outing was a special rehearsal in Grain Valley on July 25 with the Circuit Riders in preparation for an upcoming repeat event. July 30 we were at the Lee's Summit Sheppard Center.

Next morning on July 31, by the time you read this, we will have been to KCl to help honor 25 WWII Veterans who will be traveling to Washington D.C., to see the new monument erected in their honor. They are the recipients of free travel, provided by the Kansas Honor Flight, to honor them for their invaluable service during WWII. This program will also transition to Korean War, Vietnam War and all other veterans who served, on a chronological basis.

There are two veterans from the Johnson County area, and the remainder from all over Kansas. The voungest is 85 and most are in their 90's. Connie VanCampen, wife of Kansas Honor Flight President Mike VanCampen, sent us this message a couple of days ago: "Just a guick story to let you know how important this is to these men; we got a call vesterday afternoon from a quardian who was on his way to Greensburg. Ks because his dad's (the veteran) house was on fire. The house was completely destroyed.

In spite of losing everything, you and your group will be able to meet 92 vr. old Mr. George Yohn. They were and ARE an amazing group of men." For HOA gents, it might interest you to know that our own Ron Abel was the recipient of this flight a couple of years ago. He can't speak highly enough of the experience. He'd


love to share his story with you.
