This was truly a great contest. It was so good, and there is so much to learn from it, that I would urge you to go to the BHS Web site and pre-order the DVD of the top 20 choruses and/or quartets. Prior to contest, **Vince Perry** and I visited *Central Standard*, 9th place finishers, during one of their rehearsals. We each wished them well and our support, to a thunderous applause. Also to be congratulated is *Premium Blend* for their 17th place achievement.

It was also a special pleasure to be present when our own **Dan Henry** was inducted into the MC Hall of Fame. Newly-elected President-Elect **Don Fuson** accepted it on his behalf. They played the same pre-recorded video of Dan's acceptance that you saw when Dan again accepted it live at our Chapter meeting by Don and Director Emeritus, **Jim Bagby**.

And finally, a' toast – here's to the future stability and growth, of the Kansas City Chapter! This Chapter, as of January 1, 2015, will have produced three Barbershop Harmony Society Presidents in 76 years. None other than you can claim this honor.

This feat was accomplished by you taking the opportunity to share your love of music with brothers that also share their love of music, just as you do. That's the tool that will be the continuing strength to the future of this Chapter. Thanks for all you do. ♥

A Look at 2014 Las Vegas Chorus Contest

One thing stands out – the 2014 competition was the highest scoring of all time. The 6th-place chorus posted a score over 92% and the 20th-place chorus posted 83%, both records. New Zealand's *Vocal FX* placed 10th with 86.27%, but they also placed 10th in 2009 with an 88.17% score.

Choruses that competed in Toronto (2013) not in the lineup this year: 15 out of 29, including the top 3 medalist choruses and 5 of the top 10. Those included Westminster and Alexandria, which both scored well over 90% last year. Altogether, there are 10 choruses in the Society that have performed above the 90% level at an International competition in the past three years.

Choruses in this year, not in the lineup in Toronto: 17 (out of 31). Of these, 8 competed most recently in 2012, 3 in 2011, 2 in 2010, 1 in 2009, and 3 were in their first International competition. Only two choruses in this year's top 10 competed in Toronto last year. Choruses that compete every year are becoming the exception.

Qualification contests for affiliates Britain, Sweden, Australia and New Zealand were conducted either in 2012 or spring 2013. All North American districts held qualification contests in the fall of 2013.

The Dallas *Vocal Majority* posted 96.77% to win. Their best ever was in 2010 when they scored 97.10% but were second to Westminster's highest score in history, 97.73%. *The Ambassadors of Harmony* previously held that record, posting 97.53% in 2009. *The Ambassadors* in 2012 matched Dallas's 96.77%. No other chorus in any other competition has posted higher scores than these.

Choruses this year improving more than their competitors include *Great Northern Union* (+5.12%), *Kentucky Vocal Union* (+4.25%) and *The EntertainMen* (+3.97%). In our district, *Central Standard* improved 1.31% and the *Fremont Pathfinders* improved 1.54%, but the competition at their level improved by 3% or more on the average, so these choruses lost ground to the competition. Among choruses in the bottom half of the order, England's *Cottontown Chorus* posted a 3.00% gain and *Spirit of Phoenix* posted a 2.89% gain.

At the top, the *VM* had a gain of 2.88%, which they needed to hold off their pursuers, as *Masters of Harmony* posted a 3.69% gain, *GNU* climbed 5.12% and *Sound of the Rockies* 3.97%.

Last fall, *Heart of America Chorus* posted a 79.28% score, which ranked 40th among all choruses competing in the qualifying contests for the International in 2014. Had we gone to Las Vegas and competed, that score would have placed *HOA* in 28th among 32 choruses.

HOA Supports the Kansas Choral Directors Association for the 2nd Year!

The Kansas City Chapter continues to promote life-long singing and fellowship in 4-part a cappella Barbershop Music!

The Heart of America Chorus and its Membership VP Jerry Meier represented the Central States District and the Barbershop Harmony Society by exhibiting at the Kansas Choral Directors Association (KCDA) Summer Conference in Topeka. Jerry Meier set up a table-top booth in the exhibit hall and met with more than 100 choral directors and members of the KCDA.

There were two goals to accomplish:

1) promote Youth in Harmony events such as our very own Harmony Explosion! 2015;

2) get more young people involved in vocal music activities in middle school and high school.

Vocal music teachers agree that barbershop music is an effective vehicle to get more young people active and involved in choir – the challenge is to find the right music that can capture their attention and get the youngsters to jump in and give it a try!

Jerry provided several copies of some fun barbershop arrangements like *Cups* from the movie *Pitch Perfect*, Theme From *Happy Days*, and *Charlie Brown*. Teachers could also sign up to receive a free Music Educator packet from the BHS.

Jerry was also able to secure and donate one full-ride scholarship to Harmony University 2015, on the grounds of the prestigious Belmont University in Nashville, TN. This prize was given away on the last day of the conference, which ran Thursday July 10 through Saturday, July 12.

Teachers are eager to learn more about barbershop music – they just need help to get started. How can WE HELP? Simple – provide them with free music to sing in their classes. *HOA* will provide music upon request to these vocal music teachers – and you can help by donating \$5 or \$10 or \$20 toward this cause (speak to Jerry about this program).

Later this fall, Jerry will also be meeting with several of these Music Educators at the Northeast Kansas Music Educators Association Conference in Olathe. He will continue to spread the knowledge about the benefits of singing 4-part a cappella Barbershop Music – starting in Middle School and continuing beyond High School. 🎔

Top Quartets Still Lead the Way

When it comes to international competition, the best quartets continue to vie for the championship year after year. The top 9 quartets and 16 of the top 20 in Las Vegas also competed at Toronto in 2013. (Three of the remaining four are quartets that have not previously competed at the International level.) From the top 20 in 2013, 14 guartets also competed this year.

Top foursomes that did not return this year were After Hours (8th with 85.1 in 2013), Via Voice (9th with 84.87), Da Capo (10th with 84.78) and The Allies (13th, 83.68).

The guartet champion, *Musical Island Boys*, won with 89.53%, their best score in six years of competition. But their scores over the past four years were all 88.5% or better. Quartets able to score over 90 in this competition are rare (Ringmasters was the last one, scoring 91.7 in 2012.) Crossroads won in 2009 with 93.7 and Storm Front in 2010 with 91.33. Interestingly, Old School placed 2nd both years with scores above 90, but emerged a champion in 2011 with an 89.89 score.

The highest-scoring quartet competition overall was in 2009, when the average for the top 10 guartets was 88.32; and for the top 20 the average was 85.4. This year, the top-10 average was 87.32 and the top 20 average was 85.01. The 5th-place medalist guartet posted 87.98, while the 10th-place quartet finished at 84.78 and 20th place posted 81.5. The results from the 2012 competition were also at this level, making 2014 the third-highest-scoring competition year.

When results are compared to results from the gualifying competitions (most of which occurred last spring, but the affiliates held theirs earlier), all guartets could be included. The average scores at International were 0.92 percent higher than the scores in the gualifying rounds. (80.58 at International, 79.66 gualifying). For the top 20 guartets, the improvement was 1.68 percent — 85.01 compared to 83.33). This is normal and has been observed every year in recent times.

Thus, individual guartets that improved by at least 1.5 percent would be expected to finish in a position near their ranking in the preliminary rounds, while those that improved more would move up, etc. In our own Central States District, Premium Blend improved 0.43 percent, placing15th in the preliminary round, but 17th at Las Vegas. 3 Men and a Melody were just 0.06% above their prelims score and slipped from 20th to 24th position. Salty Dog improved 1.41% and placed 41st at Las Vegas, after qualifying for the contest as a wildcard entrant.

Among the top 20 guartets, the greatest improvement was shown by *Trocadero*, a new guartet from Sweden, which also competed in the collegiate competition (placing 7th with 74.83%). They placed 18th with 81.78%, a 7% improvement in just two days! (That would have won the collegiate contest if they had posted that score on Tuesday). Lunch Break surprised even themselves with a 4.6% improvement to finish 9th after placing 17th in the gualifying competitions.

The next great quartet from Sweden is Lemon Squeezy, which improved 3.6% for a 5th-place medal after placing 8th in the qualifying rounds. Silver medalist *Forefront* improved 3.33% and almost caught Musical Island Boys, who scored 0.3% below their qualifying score. Forefront was 5th in the qualifying rounds. Main Street (featured quartet on our spring show) improved 2.14 percent, placing 3rd, same position as in the qualifying rounds.

Up and coming guartets? Among those failing to make the top 20, Madison Park with tenor Wes Yoder, The Con Men, Jam Session, Last Men Standing and The Committee all showed improvements better than 3 percent.



One of the highlights of the Society international convention last month in Las Vegas was the awarding of the annual Dave LaBar master of ceremonies award to the late **Lloyd Steinkamp** and our own **Dan Henry Bowser**. We hope many of you who did not get to attend the convention saw the BHS webcast presentation by former Central States District member and head of the MC awards committee, **Larry Monson**. Dan's trophy was accepted by his fellow chapter member, Society Executive Vice President **Don Fuson**.

But the real hoopla came a couple of weeks later, at the July 15 Kansas City Chapter meeting, when Don presented the "Can You See Me Now" trophy to Dan in person. Thanks to some diligent work by brother Fuson and his laptop, we were also able to show the same acceptance video that the folks in Vegas saw. Dan's daughter, Kathy, took it and it was produced very professionally by her husband, Mark. Dan's wife of 69 years, **Estyl**, and his son, Brad, were among a giant turnout of guests. **Keith Schweer** wheeled Dan to the meeting and the afterglow!

The video was actually a little long for Dan's presentation slot that the Society folks had allowed – but it was so good, they played the whole thing, rather than editing it. Dan stays mostly close to home these days because of his emphysema, but he made a warm and humble speech. In it he noted that he is a 65-year member of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of the Barbershop Harmony Society of America, Inc., which got roar from the crowd of about 8,000

convention attendees. And he noted that he had met a lot of great barbershoppers while emceeing about a dozen internationals. The first of those was at San Antonio in 1964, and the last was right here at the 2011 convention, with Kathy as his sidekick. "Ol' Dan" and his second-favorite gal, "Sarah Jane," have emceed more HOA shows than he can count, and many CSD contests. He is a member of our district Hall of Fame. At the chapter level, he is a past president, former director, winner of the Ozzie Award (twice) and one of only four men to earn the chapter's highest honor, the Joe Stern Award.

He also made his mark in some pretty popular comedy quartets, starting with the *Merry Mugs*. The other members of the quartet, now all passed on, were **Ed Rooker**, who replaced original tenor **Dennis Tay-Ior**; lead **Frank Leone**, and bass **Bob Gall**, who went on to become 1969 Society president. They were the first foursome picked by the USO to entertain our wounded Vietnam War troops, during a tour of the far east and a trip to the Philippines.

Dan later sang bari with *Hubbub*, a foursome formed primarily to preserve Merry Mug routines. The lead was the late **Manley Vance**, Gall was the bass and I sang tenor. After Gall's death in 1995, **Willard Yoder** sang bass. And for 14 years, until last spring, Ol' Dan was the lead (mostly) of the 2001 CSD senior quartet champs, all-comedy Tone-Henge. The tenor was **Bruce Wenner, Schweer** was the bass and I was the bari (mostly).

Dave LaBar, for whom the award is name, will be remembered by some of you as the lead of the medalist quartet *Sidekicks* from Florida, who headlined our show in the early '90s. He was a comic master, portly to large most of his life and a brilliant emcee. He died suddenly in his early 40s.

When Theresa arrived I stepped down rather than be trampled by This Joint Is Jump'n. They didn't work much on the uptune but focused instead on the ballad Make Them Hear You. The sound was amazing! You know the sound when it's wall to wall? It has a special sound that I can appreciate but can not describe. After fifty years of barbershop I never get tired of hearing barbershop music like I did that night. The choreo on the ballad had a Broadway musical feel to it with all faces looking past the audience with such reverence and passion. It was a commanding performance; a gold medal experience for old VP. I smiled all the way home!

My next barbershop experience was attending the St. Joseph, MO Chapter's annual show. It was held in the same church they did last year when *HOA* was their guest chorus. The sound in that sanctuary was totally awesome! This year, the *Voices of America* chorus surprised me and others on just how much improved they were from the year before. They got a new director, **Steve Scott**, and with basically the same guys they had the year before, sang many challenging arrangements in tune. I am so happy that the *JoeTown* chorus is back singing well. I predict their membership will grow quickly with this new sound.

McPhly was the feature quartet and they too were young and awesome.

The late Society Musical Coach **Chet Fox** and past *Pony Expressman* **Bob Fox's** son sang tenor in *McPhly*. It was pretty special to see and realize the generations of barbershoppers I've been privileged to call friends. The show was emceed by *HOA's* own Director Emeritus **Jim Bagby**. As usual he was masterful! (and entertaining!)

Jim and I talked about *HOA* and my absence. I think he kind of understood. The very next Tuesday I went back to *HOA*. By the way when I ran into Jim that evening he grinned and said "Couldn't stay away!" He was right.

Next stop was Las Vegas and the International Convention. **Melladee** and I took in three musicals while still seeing all the CSD quartets in the quarter-finals, all of the top 20, the whole day of chorus competition, and the finals and show. The Kansas City Metro Chapter's *Central Standard* chorus performance was pure excellence. I was emotionally moved by both their songs, especially the ballad. I'm not sorry to admit they both were tear-jerkers for me. I was so proud of them! I hope everyone that did not attend does get a chance to see the *Toronto Northern Lights* final chorus performance as reigning International Champions. It was so touching that words fail me. So was the acceptance speech of the new quartet champions *The Musical Island Boys.* It's a must see! "Well said" is an extreme understatement!

Back on the home front our new director **Jerry Garrard** is doing a great job of teaching and motivating excellence in singing. We've already gotten a few new members and a couple of old members coming back. Let's hope that *HOA* can continue to maintain its century membership status and field a good-singing chorus in the 80s. (At least 80 in the chorus that is singing in the 80's) Those were the good old days for many of us and the good days ahead for the *Heart of America Chorus* and Chapter. As our Immediate Past Director **Mark Fortino** said a million times last year "Is it Tuesday yet?" It's great to be a barbershopper! And I'm happy again to be back with my *HOA* pals. \checkmark



Harmony Foundation Report

Note that we will have our raffle each time we meet in our regular location. All of the proceeds of the raffle not given as prizes or used for expenses of the raffle goes to Harmony Foundation at the end of each year. In return, we are able to have the Foundation designate up to 30% of the funds given to chapter activities such as Harmony Explosion.

As of July 23, after 25 drawings (9 since the last report): The total collected for Harmony Foundation since the last report is \$143.

The total collected for the year to date is \$461.

There have been FOUR jackpot winners so far in 2014, each for \$100. As a result, the prize fund is in deficit \$165 as of July 23. \heartsuit
