Bob quickly stepped in to direct us through the annual show in June and we were very excited and appreciative that he did a terrific job of directing us through that show. Bob was ably assisted by our Director Emeritus, **Jim Bagby**, as well as **Carter**

Combs, Associate Director, on the show, and they will both continue to assist Bob through our many upcoming activities, including Fall Contest and our annual Holiday Harmony Spectacular (HHS) Show! We know the direction of the *HOA* chorus is in very good hands during this interim period, and we are moving forward!

Speaking of Fall Contest, we have narrowed the list of songs that we might take to contest down to 3 songs, with the intention that we will make the final decision of the 2 songs that we will be taking to contest before the end of August. The 3 candidate songs are: (1) Brother Can You Spare a Dime; (2) Basin Street Blues; and (3) Once in a Lifetime/I'll Be Seeing You.

Two of those songs, *HOA* has sung before at contest, so the learning curve for contest will not be too steep for those re-ioining us at this stage in the year who want to go with us to Fall contest.

The Music Team is working on deciding the HHS show music list, and plans to make decisions about what we will be singing on the Holiday Show in the next month, so that everyone will have plenty of time to learn the notes and lyrics for songs on that show and for the Caroling Caravan, both in December. Learning tracks for the HHS show music are already out on the *HOA* members' portion of the web-site if you want to start working on the Christmas music. The chorus has already starting practicing some of the songs that we know we will be singing on the HHS show, and as we finalize the remaining songs our practice list will be expanded to include those as well.



Kansas Choral Directors Association (KCDA) Summer Conference in Topeka

The Heart of America Barbershop Chorus had an exhibit at the Kansas Choral Directors Association (KCDA) Summer Conference in Topeka on July 6 and 7. More than 130 vocal music educators from middle schools, high schools, colleges and universities across the state were in attendance. Jerry Meier (Harmony Explosion! Director and Membership VP) set up a tabletop display of 4-part a Capella Barbershop music for review.

Vocal music educators are looking for new ways to attract and keep young singers (boys and girls) in their programs. They have no outlet (like a local music store or publishing company) to access and view Barbershop music—other than searching online. *HOA's* participation in the KCDA Summer Conference provides an outlet by introducing new teachers to Barbershop. That's one reason why I insist that *HOA* participate in this event. *HOA* gives teachers the opportunity to review review the music and ask questions about incorporating Barbershop into their programs.

The second reason to attend the KCDA Summer Conference is to stay in touch with all of these vocal music educators. I have built relationships with many of them over the past 5 years, and I continue to establish new relationships each year. I will communicate with the teachers in the fall, support them, and get them ready for Harmony Explosion! 2018, to be held at Olathe East High School on Saturday, Feb. 17.

As a reminder, Harmony Explosion! is a fun, mistake-friendly and effective vehicle that teachers can use to encourage participation in their own programs, while promoting Barbershop music all year. Can I count on your support for these vocal music educators this fall and next spring?

Vince Perry provided the attached photograph after the video of our performance of "Basin Street Blues" in Philadelphia was played at the Aug. 1 chapter meeting.

A lot has happened over the past 7 years. What has become of the 59 men who sang for *HOA* in Philadelphia?

One (**Jim Clark**) is in Chapter Eternal.

Two (Jim Moynihan and Anthony Fortino) have moved out of the area.

Four have become so disabled that they are not able to continue singing with us.

Four have just dropped out, not involved with barbershop at all these days.

Six are still on the HOA roster, but are no longer active with the chorus.

Nine were Leavenworth chapter members who joined us just to be with us that year. All nine remain active today with their own chapter, but not with us.


Twelve joined *Central Standard* and now are active with that chapter.

That leaves 21 men who were on the risers then and continue to be active with us today.

Five of our currently active members were active chapter members in 2010 but did not sing with us in Philadelphia.

Ten of our currently active members joined the chapter after the 2010 competition. (Three this year)

Conclusion? You can draw your own, but I see 36 active chapter members that have what it takes to to continue to make this chapter one of the best and most respected in our Society. Let us look ahead to what we can do together and not worry about what we cannot do.

VAL PUTZIER 1933~2017



VALDEAN "Val" PUTZIER, 83, died June 17, 2017, in his hometown of Paola, KS. He was born in Elkader, IA, and graduated from Garnavillo, IA High School in 1951. There were only 19 students in his graduating class, so he learned to play several instruments in the band plus singing in his high school glee club and he sang in a barbershop quartet for two or three years until one of the older guys graduated and they had to break up.

He joined the U.S. Navy after high school and was stationed in Japan during the Korean conflict, working as an air traffic controller. He moved to the Kansas City area in 1959 after he left the Navy and hired on at the Federal Aviation Agency (FAA), working most of his time in the Olathe facility. He retired from the FAA in 1984.

Val was a quiet guy with a good sense of humor and a deeper-thanusual bass voice. He joined the Olathe Chapter in 1971 and sang in several quartets before joining HOA in 1973. He participated in a lot of singing events over the years, he recalled years later, both with the Olathe and HOA choruses, and kept up his singing in his church choir. His son, **Mike**, also was a regular with *HOA* in the late 1970s. Other than singing, he loved fishing, and would travel anywhere to seek the big ones. But he loved just spending time on the farm ponds in his Miami County area.

Val sang with the Cross Town 4 – the first Central States District Senior Quartet Champions – for a number of years, replacing original bass Fred Whisman. But as time went on and age took its toll, the quartet became less active. So Val joined the New Harmony Handful. singing at many churches and other venues throughout the Kansas City area. In the NHH, he sang with Dale Neuman, Jon **Gathright** and **Rich Huyck** in the *A Cappella Fellas*.

Val was diagnosed with lung cancer in the first half of 2017 and though surgeons were hopeful its removal was successful, the cancer returned with a vengeance. About 35 members of HOA, sang I Believe and Friends and the Harmony Handful sang It Is Well With My Soul at his funeral. He leaves his wife of 57 years, Jan, a longtime HOA supporter; son **Mike** and daughters **Toni, Debbie** and **Suzan**; 12 grandchildren, and 3 great-grandchildren.

ALFRED J. "AL" MORITZ 1928~2017

Alfred J. "Al" Moritz was a steadfast member of the Barbershop Harmony Society and the HOA Chorus for almost 50 years. Music was a big part of his life. He was born and raised in Chicago and sang in the Choral Club in high school. He attended a number of technical schools during his 41 years at AT&T and sang with the Illinois Bell Telephone Chorus from 1950 to 1962 and in the Four Phonies quartet, an auxiliary unit of the *Illinois Bell Telephone Chorus*. He joined the Barbershop Society and the Southwest Suburban Chapter in Oak Lawn, IL, in 1956 and when he transferred to Kansas City in 1963, he joined the Kansas City Chapter. Here he sang with a quartet that changed names four different times beginning with The Gamboliers and ending with the Kansas Citians. The quartet had many members over the years and was believed to be the longest-running active quartet in *HOA* history. Al brought a lot of quartet experience to our chapter and was known for his solo work in the Kansas Citians on "Where the River Shannon Flows", and "Hector the Garbage Collector."

Al is often remembered as a front-row man. He and Ron Abel received recognition on our 50th annual show for performing for 35 consecutive years in the front row. In fact, he continued to perform in row 1 for a couple of years after his hearing got so bad he could not hear to sing. He just lip-synched, smiled and did all the staging – most of the chorus did not even know. The music team called it "the Al Moritz' rule." He was a friend and favorite of all HOA members and audiences alike with his antics, choreography and always bright smile. He served as chapter president in 1973.

He left the chorus when his age caught up with him, but he would occasionally drop by the rehearsal hall to watch and hear the chorus sing. He'd stay for awhile then join his friends at the local afterglow after rehearsal. It was good to see him at the latest Guest Night festivities in April.

Al died at home but not in bed as he had hoped. He was often heard to respond to those who asked how he was doin', "Oh, C+, I guess."

Harold R. Solomon, known by his friends as Sam, died June 14, 2017. He was 91. Harold was born Sept. 16, 1925, in Marshall, MO and graduated from the University of Notre Dame. He served in the United States Navy during the Korean War

and worked as an investment broker at E. F. Hutton & Co. in Kansas City.

Sam was a long-time member of the Kansas City Chapter and Heart of America Chorus and sang baritone in the chorus when he was active. He served as President of the Kansas City Chapter in 1967. Though he was not an active member for a number of years, he visited the chapter on occasion to see his old friends. His last visit was in 2005 at the **Don Webb** Recognition night.

Sam was a member of St. Thomas More Catholic Church for 49 years and was a member of other organizations and clubs in Kansas City including St. Joseph Hospital Auxiliary. He is survived by his wife, Joyce, of 58 years, children John, Mary Jeanne, and **Lisa** and is survived by four grandchildren and many nephews and nieces. Services were held Saturday, June 17 at St. Thomas More Catholic Church.

- Jay Giallombardo, baritone in *Grandma's Boy's* (1979) and the director of the New Tradition Chorus (2001).
- **Jeff Oxlev**. bass in *Rapscallions* (1984) and *Acoustix* (1990). and the director of the Masters of Harmony Chorus (1999).
- Jim Henry, bass in the Gas House Gang (1993) and the director of the Ambassadors of Harmony Chorus in 2004
- Mark Hale, lead in Michigan Jake (2001) and the director of the Masters of Harmony Chorus in 2002 and in 2005. How about taking home gold medals in three internationals out of five...wow!

Note that in this elite group (make that elite of elites), 50% are baritones. That's 100% greater than the statistical expectation would suggest. Yessir...go baritones!

RESULTS OF THE ACTIVE AND INACTIVE MEMBER SURVEYS AND DISCOVERY FORUM

Many of you have been asking what we have done about all of the data that we collected earlier in the year with our Discovery Forum and member surveys. Well, I will admit to you that this is still a work in progress. The board has now had 3 special all-evening meetings - off-site - to discuss all of the data that we have collected. I must admit that the take-away's are somewhat mixed, as members have openly suggested a number of different ideas for improving HOA. including our Tuesday night chorus meetings, and it's clear that what is really important for one member is not necessarily really important for another member. Therefore, we have tried to take a step backward and look for "trends" in inputs received – all appreciated, by the way!

Starting with this *Harmonotes* article, we are going to start revealing to all of the participants, and other interested members, the specific things that your HOA Board has gleaned from all of this data, massive as it is. However, note that we are certainly not finished, and before we do put this topic to rest, the Board intends to create a long term strategy and "plan" that will help the chorus regain the momentum that we feel that we have somehow lost over the past several years. So, stay tuned!

By the way, if any of you, Board members or not, have an interest in helping us create this L/T strategy and plan, please let me know of your interest and I will put you to work (so to speak).

Here are some immediate (low hanging fruit) take-away's that the Board has agreed to implement:

Immediate Implementation


- 1. More vocal Instruction (feeds goals of many members' responses to why they joined HOA). Music team has already started this during warmups at first of each meeting – try to provide worthwhile instruction/practice to entice members to be on-time at 7PM
- 2. Changes to Tuesday meeting/rehearsals
 - Breaks in rehearsal to give members time to socialize and sing in quartets/VLQ's
 - More "fun" PVP activities like tag quartet singing, Polecat songs, woodshedding
 - Section rehearsals specify goals for each session so work complements things chorus is working on
 - Riser time (performing mode) each week, usually after break

- 3. Quarterly guest nights -aimed at recruiting new members with food or refreshments
- 4. Acquire "riser stools" for members who cannot stand on risers for extended times, so they will not have to sit on chairs "off risers"

Medium Term Implementation

- 5. More singing gigs (feeds goals of many members who want to perform to audiences more). We should contact VisitKC, local community festivals, local chapters of philanthropic organizations like Kiwanis, Optimists, VFW, Rotary
- **6.** Assign "administrative" section leaders to go with section leaders to follow-up with absent members and pass along information pertinent to whole section
- 7. Acquire a "social chairman" to help schedule and plan non-singing social events (bar-B-cues, ball games, other activities to foster camaraderie and fellowship between members
- 8. Initiate brief 10 minute meetings after rehearsals by directors and section leaders to discuss upcoming section rehearsals. homework for chorus members, agenda for next week, etc.
- Acquire coaching expertise at retreats and at Tuesday rehearsals for singing, choreography, and acting skills (as in "Ghost Riders", "Brother Can You Spare a Dime", and "Basin Street")
- 10.Increased utilization of Social Media to market the chorus. both for selling tickets for events as well as recruiting new members

The Board is also setting some longer term goals, and will then utilize those in the yet-to-be-created strategic planning document mentioned above, which will be distributed to all. Bear with us - we know that this process is of extreme importance to the future of HOA.
